

GRANTS

CAMPBELLTON WINS SEASON FASTEST GAME WITH BRILLIANT VICTORY

Visiting Summerside Team, C Section, Defeated by Sco One of the Amazing Speed Team Play—Every Member Turned in A Stellar Performance All Through.

If there remained one shred of doubt as to the ability of the Campbellton Vets to continue their remarkable work of the latter part of the hockey season here, it was forcibly removed by their brilliant performance on Tuesday night when in the fastest and most spectacular game of the season here they defeated the visiting Summerside team, champions of Prince Edward Island in the E. A. H. A., to the merry tune of an 8-1 score.

In view of Tuesday's sensational victory it is hoped that an exhibition game with Summerside may be arranged, but if this does not materialize, the recent victory of the local boys supplies a fitting climax to their season's activities.

Brilliant Work

Tuesday's match was a memorable one for in this game the locals showed greater speed and stamina than was expected of them even by those who knew the team best. The visiting squad is one of the best aggregations in the Maritime Provinces and the Campbellton team showed their superiority over them in Tuesday's engagement. The contest, despite the one-sidedness of the score was exceptionally fast from beginning to end and for two brief lulls in the second stanza. The match was hard fought throughout; for the visitors put up a splendid game, but the work of the locals constituted an unusual exhibition. They took the first period and kept constantly on the attack until the final going, giving the most brilliant performance ever placed to its credit by a Campbellton team. The first period opened with a rush at 9:40 and it was one of the most brilliant that Campbellton was honored by speedy guests. The Summerside boys began with a whirlwind rush and after two minutes had the puck in the right place at a critical moment. Gauthier at centre for the visitors got a bad fall on this juncture and was relieved by Morris for the balance of the period.

McLean opened the scoring in the last section with a successful shot after an end to end rush and scored on a pass from Matthews, Howard added another unaided; Sharpe tallied the seventh on a drive up along the board and Howard notched the eighth and final score on a timely pass from Wilkins.

One feature of Tuesday's game was the fact that every local player distinguished himself in the match and either scored individually or directly assisted in bagging the disc. LeBlanc gave a stellar performance in the local mix. Even in the most critical and pressing moments he remained cool and collected and many spectacular saves. McLean and Sharpe on defence gave a brilliant performance and Miller, relieving the latter, did some of his finest work of the season. Wilkins and Thomas on the wings played a star game, Thomas with many a splendid game to his credit, did some exceptionally clever and effective work. With his amazing agility and headwork in dangerous tangles, Matthews surpassed all his playing of even those days when he was the mainstay of the Campbellton team. Howard at centre also gave a brilliant performance. Rev. W. S. McLean refereed the game to the satisfaction of all.
