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QUINCY, July 22.—A report reached here that Bouchard, with his frigate schooner and cargo of whisky, had at last succeeded in eluding the searches of the naval and military authorities, and was expected to arrive at L'Isle aux Coudres, not very far from this city, at 2 o'clock yesterday morning.

Yesterday the necessary authority was given by the Minister of Militia, and a force of 40 soldiers under a major and captain, fully armed and accompanied by a staff-sergeant, was ordered to proceed to the island to protect Colonel Forsyth and his officers in making a thorough search of the schooner's retreat.

News received from Bois St. Paul is to the effect that B. Battery contingent has not been seen at Isle aux Coudres. The McNaughton was due there about 10 a.m. The contingent consequently may be somewhere near the island. Passenger Agent Huse Said to Come Under the Contract Law. BUFFALO, N.Y., July 22.—Immigration Inspector D. H. Huse called upon Robert Ruse, Grand Trunk Railway Passenger Agent, to-day and ordered him to return to the country from which he came.

Huse is a Canadian and Dr. Barry says he is not properly qualified to draw pay for labor in Canada, and that he is a family man in Canada, and on the date of his employment he had taken no steps to become a citizen.
