Lynch-Staunton expressed regret that under the terms of the agreement Canada was required to maintain the land as a park, or it would revert to the rship of the French Government. This, they asserted, was too much like a contract between real estate men. Senator Casgrain said that under the international law all France could do was to give Canada use of the property in perpetuity. Senator Dandurand, leader of the Government, regretted criticism of the agreement and said the French Government had taken the attitude that Canada must not buy when France could give.

Senator Dandurand, who moved adop tion of the resolution, said Canada wa thankful to France for her generous of-fer.
