## THE GOVERNMENT BUILDING AT ANnapolis

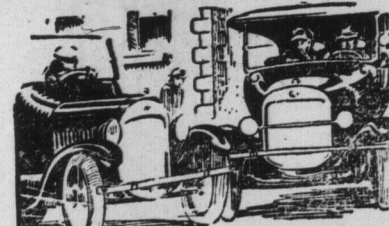
