

# THE INDEPENDENT FORESTER.

High Court, through its High Secretary, as provided in Supreme Court Rules. No Subordinate Court shall order supplies from the High Secretary in any amount less than the sum of one dollar, and in each case, the same must invariably accompany the order for supplies.

Your especial attention is directed to the foregoing provisions of law, that you may give them instant your immediate attention and avoid the necessity of executing Section 166 relating to suspension of Courts.

The Supreme Court clearly desire its intentions regarding these matters, and in any case where Courts fail to comply, on or before the 20th day of July, 1858, the said failure will work their immediate suspension.

While the High Court is endeavoring to spread the Order in this State, we hope that each Court and each individual member thereof will use his best efforts toward increasing the membership of his own Court, for, with your cordial support, we shall rank the one of the best years. We are confident that our Order is second to none, and it bids fair to become the greatest institution of its kind in the world.

We, therefore, urge upon the members to use all diligence possible toward the further advancement of the Order, both as to increase of membership and quality of tourists effected.

The Secretary of any Court whose members do not receive the Forester, will please send the names and addresses of such brethren to the High Secretary. They will also report without delay, the name of a newly recommended Court Deputy, together with his street and number to the High Secretary and not to the Supreme Secretary.

In consequence of the election of officers and representatives having been changed from annual to annual, and that said annual elections occur in December of each year, the following ruling has become necessary in so far as relates to representatives to High Court. Where the annual session of a High Court takes place after the first of July, the basis of representation of Subordinate Courts thereon will be determined by the number of members in good standing on the 20th day of June, and if that number should entitle the Court to more representatives than were elected at the regular election in the preceding December, the Court may elect the additional representatives or representatives at the first regular meeting held after the 20th of June, or at any subsequent regular meeting before the meeting of the High Court.
