## NEWS OE THE WE KK,

The Provincial Exhibition for Ontario closed on Friday Evening-and was universally admitted to be a grand success. The Western Exhibitors were relighted with the grounds, the amplitude of the accommoda tion nad the ready access to the Exhibition grounds, by steamers and railway cars. The total receipts taken at the gates will amount to over $\$ 11,500$. On Friday evening the Council of the Agricultural and Arta' Asso cintion, were entertained at the Rideau Club by Uis Worsbip the Mayor and Messrs IIon. James Skead, "Alonz) Wright, M. P., and J. M. Currier, M. P.

Judge Ramsey in his charge to the Montreal Grand Jury, at the opening of the Court of Queen's Bencb, on the 24 th inst., condemned in strong terma the disgracefal conduct of the rioters at the City Hall aud at the Catholic Cemetary, Montreal. He said they must be punished.

From Quebec we learn that the storm which began on Thursday night, the l6th inst., and continued unabated all the foliow ing day, has done considerable darbege. A scooner and a barge laden with flour were sunk in the St. Charles. There has been much damage done in the timber coves. A raft of square timber and one of oak were hroken up; also three rafts of sav logs at Montmorency. The damage done inland will be considerable. The weather is unusually cold, with rain, occasionally accompanied with snow. A ship is ashore at new Liverpool. The schooner Undaunted lost both anchors and was otherwise danniged. A tug towed her to safe quartern, The Nor. wegian bark Canada, loading at Indian Cove, broke from her moorings. A lug towed her to a safe anchorage, 'The ship' Agamemnon broke adrift and grounded at the Eriest's wharf; she was nssisted off. fhe bark Wilhelmino is ashore at St. Nichols full of water. The mountains to tho nersh were white with snow.

The ensts which the Fahrigne of Montreal will have to pry in the Guiberd legislation are estimated at $\$ 20,000$.

A toam of Hrmilton riflemen have gone to Crepdmnor to shont against the Ameteur Rifle Club of New York, on Saturday, 25 th.
The Globe says that the disadvantages suffered by the British in the Nerfoundland fisheries, as compared with Frenchmen, have nowize abated the present season. The offisars of the French oruisers, protecting Fronch intereals, have assumed a very ligh tone in asserting their rights there' abouts.

Burgulars amused themselves on Saturday night by stealing miskets. ammunition and overcoats from the drill shed at Watford.

Two feet of snow fell at the Riviere dut loup; Que, on Friday and Sriturday, 17 th and 18th. Snow also foll on Mount IVash. ington in New Hampshiro.

Reporta from Galveaton, Terns, and other parts in the Gulf of Mexico empinue to bring the most harrowing details of the dreadful loss of life and property by the recent tidal wave.

Persons who witnessed the Texas cyclone confirm the most sensational aceounts of it. Out of three hundred houses only five arg left standing The wher rose six feet in two hours and was driven by the wind at a velocity of fifteen miles an hour, sweeping everything in its way and covering the plain in rear of the place for ten miles with the rebris. Olher settlementa with an ag gregate populetion of 150 were swept out of existence, making the total lozs of life at Indianola 450 . A band of Mexionna commenced robbing the dead, but were driven off by the citizens of (ialreston, who caught and killed fire of them.

A derpaten from Galyeston states that a steamship has just anived there, and reports the town of Indianola, Texas, almost entirely destroyed. Light houzes, wharves and nearly every house have been sivept away, and ove hundred to one hundred and fifly lives lost. The ateamer could find no place to land her cargo.

The Creedmoor grouncls wera invaded on Saturday by the wives, daushters, and sis ters of the sharrshonters. It was called the ladies matoh, and eyery man who participated appenred with at least a dozen of the fair sex. Each marksman was supposel to shoot for one of his fair friends, the prizes being a $\$ 75$ sewing machino and a number of cigar cases, cud stamis, glove hoses, jepol cases, and so on. The sewing machine was won by Genoral Dakin, for his
wife.

Baty's ship yard, al Quebec, was destroyed by fire on the 18 th inst.

A large quantity of war supplies bas beon successafully landed in Cuba by friends of the insurgents.

Reinforcements to the number of 18,000 will go to Cuba by the 15 th of November next

The Borrd of Naval Officere, consisting of Rear Adimiral John Rodgers, Commodore James M. Spotts, and Capt. Paul Shirley, appointed by the Secretary of the United States Navy to inquire into the circumstances attending the loss of the Lnited States steamer Saranac in Seymour Narrows, on the Pacifio const, having completed the inrestigation, report to the Secrctiry thit no further proceedings are necessary, the lose of the vessel being entirely accidental.

Admiral Wellesley and the officers of the British lleet were entertained at a ball at Providence, Rhode Island.

A despatch from the Red Cloud agency aays it is probable now that the Indian Commission will apard the price and terma asked by the Indians for the Black IIIIs instead of proposing a price.
Emigration is diminishing from Scotland as well as from Eugland and Ireland. In the sefen months ending the 31st ult. the number of emigrants who set sall from the ports on the Clyde was 12,259, as against 17.500 in the sime period of 1874 . The falling off is mainly in the Canndian and United States traffic, the sailings to New Zaaland and Australin being very similar to those of last year.

Subscriptinns for Eapt. Webb, the Englishman who lately swam across the channel from Dover to Calais, are pouring in from all parts of England. It is expected thit at least $\$ 25,000$ will be raised.
Sir John Arnott his placed tho sum of $\$ 100,000$ in the hands of five trustees to be used for the benefit of Protestant and Catho' lic charities in the city of Cork.
Queen Victoria has given her name and patronage to the Churoh of England 'lemperance Society, and advised the Society that she did so expressly only because it is a temperance and not total abstinince society.
