FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

MR. EDITOR,—

In your last issue you published the decisions of the General Assembly regarding the work of French Evangelization. From these it will be seen that the funds for the Kankakee Mission, and for French work in Canada, are united; that the Chatham Presbytery, and not Mr. Chiniquy personally, is to settle all legal questions affecting Church property at St. Anne, and that Canada is hereafter to enjoy the services of Mr. Chiniquy. The mission at Kankakee is not to be abandoned. It continues under the care of the Presbytery, and I will receive such attention from Mr. Chiniquy as may be deemed necessary, while he is set free to labour chiefly throughout
