THE LATE REV. FATHER LEQUERRER—RESOLUTION OF CONDOLENCE.—At a monthly meeting of the St. Ann's Total Abstinence and Benefit Society, held in the St. Ann's Hall, on Sunday, the 8th inst., the following resolutions were adopted:—

Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God in His infinite wisdom to remove from amongst us, by the hand of death, one of our beloved priests, Rev. Father Lequerra, and

Whereas, it is meet that we should place on record the deep sorrow which fills our hearts in consequence of the sad event,

SENSATION.—Editor of the True Witness: Dear Sir,—The Montreal Herald is certainly "ahead" in the "manufacture" of "sensations"—In a thrilling account given by them in Holy Week of a "Narrow Escape" during the ceremonies on Holy Thursday at the Sacred Heart Convent, Sault au Recollet, our sensationist informs us that the girls taking part in the ceremonial were robed in white, whereas, they wore their uniform dresses of black—further that but for the presence of mind of the Reverend Father had been serious—but strange to say the Reverend Father knew nothing whatever about the affair until he was informed of it when leaving the Convent after the conclusion of the ceremonies. The truth is that one of the children in extinguishing the candle she carried—instead of raising her veil over her head as she should have done, brought the candle under the veil which took fire, but was immediately extinguished by those near her. So great was the "excitement" that scarcely any person present noticed the "Narrow Escape." The Star copied the Herald's account of the "sensational."

CANADIAN ITEMS.

CONVENT OF THE SACRED HEART.—Before attempting a report of the interesting ceremony we intend to describe, we will devote a few lines to the Convent in which it took place—the magnificent Sacred Heart. The Sisters were first introduced into Canada, by the then Archbishop of Quebec, at St. Jacques de l'Achigan, in 1842. The fame of their talents and learning having reached Bishop Bourget, he prevailed on them to remove to Montreal, and in the course of the year 1847, they settled on the spot where St. Vincent de Paul now stands, in the house, we believe, which was destroyed by fire some time since. There they remained until the spring of 1858, when the old monastery became much too small for the growing wants of the community, and as soon as it was completed, they removed to the old place, now famous throughout the Dominion as "the Convent of the Sacred Heart." The building is an imposing structure, facing the river and surrounded by magnificent grounds, which in summer time is converted into croquet lawns, arbors, and groves. A large and well-filled conservatory is seen on one side of the gardens, and on the other is a shrine dedicated to Water Admirabell. The little cemetery, with its rows of wooden crosses, nestles in a corner of the grounds, and is cared for, we believe, by the "Children of Mary." The interior of the Convent is in keeping with so much exterior beauty. Large study rooms, spacious recreation halls, lightsome dormitories, are found in this monastery which is, by the way, replete with every modern improvement; hot air, hot and cold water, gas, &c. One could hardly believe that a magnificent institution is so near us, that such advantages for first class education is within the reach of all, and yet, that both are so little appreciated. A word now about the ceremony of Tuesday of last week. On that day, two young ladies were invested with the novices habit in the Convent Church. They were Miss M. Dwyer of Kingston; and Miss A. Jordan, sister-in-law to our esteemed fellow citizen Mr. R. O'Neill. The Church which is a perfect gem, was on this occasion beautifully decorated. The altar was resplendent in gold flowers, and various tinted lights, exotic flowers of the rarest order, all grown in the conservatory alluded to above, and hanging baskets of choicest plants, decked the sides of each shrine. The Church was ornamented by the Sisters, and this is the highest eulogium we can give synonymously for exquisite taste and delicacy. Mass had been celebrated at eight o'clock, hence when the friends of the aspirants arrived at ten, only the ceremony of the "Prise d'habit" was performed. The young ladies robed as brides entered the chapel, a little after ten, preceded by two little girls, Miss A. Mullarky and Maria O'Neill, niece of Miss Jordan—bearing a basket in which were placed the humble habit of the novice. These little children, aged about four years, looked charming in white dresses and veils. The "brides elect" knelt on *Prise Dieu*, elegantly covered in white, and after a sermon by Rev. Father Campion, who took for his text—"I have rejoiced because I was to approach the house of the Lord," they advanced, and received from the hands of the officiating clergyman—the white veil of the Order. The young bridesmaids again bore away the robes, and

followed by two of the Sisters, the two novices left the church. The choir intoned the Magnificat, after which Mde. Laddigan sang, "O Quam Bonum" in a sweet, soft voice, we have seldom heard outside a Monastery. At the close of this anthem, a March was played on organ, harp and piano, and the two lovely girls appeared in the Chapel. They had discarded the shimmering silks and rich jewels, for the lowly serge of the Novitiate—the comforts and ease of a happy home for the sacrifices of a religious life—the trials of the world for the safety of the cloister, and "verily, they hath chosen the better part." After the ceremony was over, the invited guests were entertained by the nuns, and after the long drive out, with bad roads and chilly winds, the repeat, presided over by Rev. Fathers Campion and Lonergan, was done full honor to. The thanks of the party were, before parting, heartily tendered to Mother Tomassini, Mesdames Duffy, Starnes and Laddigan, for the hospitable and courteous treatment received at their hands. We wish, in conclusion, to the new novices, all the graces and blessings which are necessary to the life they have chosen, above all, may Heaven grant them Final Perseverance.

The building will be capable of accommodating about 600 boys. The plan for the proposed school has been compiled by Mr. Roy, and will be submitted to the Local Government for its approval during the present week, by a deputation of the School Commissioners.

THE POLICE.—Our citizens will learn with dismay that the Government of this Province have decided on disbanding the Provincial Police on the 30th inst. His Worship the Mayor having received a notification to that effect. We are of opinion that the Corporation offered as much as they could reasonably afford under the present financial difficulties of the city, and that the Government will soon find out that they have made a most egregious mistake. It now remains for the city to reorganize a force suitable to its requirements and treasury. —Quebec Chronicle.

INVESTING IN NOVA SCOTIA GOLD MINES.—We learn from good authority that a number of Pennsylvania capitalists are making enquiries with a view to investing a large amount of money in the gold mines of Nova Scotia. Capital in the United States is seeking investment; and attention has been directed to our gold mines through recent statements in the papers regarding yield. There must be millions in our gold mines, if properly worked. We believe there never yet has been a company taken hold of any of them with capital sufficient for their ample development; and there is plenty evidence to believe that the returns will be more than commensurate with the outlay. —Acadian Recorder.
