CANADIAN ITEMS.
SCHOONER DAMAGED.—The schooner E. J. Peters became waterlogged when about six miles off this port last night and had to be towed by a tug. She was lumber laden for Toronto, and will have to be unloaded and go on dry dock.

NARROW ESCAPE.—A man named Hugh Martin stepped off a train whilst passing over the Grand Trunk Railway bridge, and fell a distance of twenty-six feet in the water. He escaped with a few bruises.

KILLED.—On Wednesday a boy aged seven, son of B. Kenny, blacksmith, Chelsea, in company with other children, was playing about the lock slide, when a pile of deal ends fell upon him, knocking him into the slide. He was rescued immediately, but life was extinct. A little daughter of J. O. Stair, of Cornwallis, is dead from the effects of scalds received by falling into a tub of hot water. Last evening a daughter of W. H. Belcher, of Cornwallis, aged thirteen years, died at a hotel here while under the effects of ether during the performance of a surgical operation.

In the afternoon, however, the tide again turned in favor of the Anti-Dunkinites, who at 5 o'clock had a majority of 197, the figures being nays 1,456, yeas 1,259. It is understood that no votes will be polled on Monday, it being the civic holiday. As it is not a statutory holiday, however, the Mayor has agreed to formally open the poll at the usual hour, and immediately thereafter to close it until the next day with the consent of the scrutineers of both parties.
