Some hon. Members: Shame.

An hon. Member: The Chair has ruled.

Mr. MacInnis: When the minister stands in his place and says I have made baseless accusations against the officers of Devco, he must substantiate it. I can substantiate all the statements I made. They can be supported, and I will support them with no less than a letter written to me by this minister who claims my statement is baseless. I have in my file a letter signed by the minister himself, which makes a liar out of Mr. Blackmore and makes a fool out of the minister.
