GOVERNMENT POSITION

Hon. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa): Since the Minister has reiterated in the answer he gave me one minute ago, and in answers he has given to the Liberal Party as well, that the Government intends to go ahead and make a decision about star wars, and intends to make a decision about trade matters, before the consultative process is over, will he acknowledge that this is a sham process, that it is going to cost the Canadian people thousands of dollars, probably on a weekly basis, and that it makes a whole mockery out of democratic consultation? If the Minister acknowledges that, will he put an end to this sham process?

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, I remind the Leader of the New Democratic Party that he asked me if a decision would await a final report of the committee. The answer is that a decision obviously cannot await that final report—

Mr. Clark (Yellowhead): I made it clear earlier that I was not going to accept the deadlines imposed by the Secretary of Defense of the United States. Nor do I think we should accept other artificial deadlines. What we should seek is a means by which, before we decide, we have the maximum possible opportunity to hear from the people of our country. We have provided a process which would allow the public of Canada to speak on this issue, beginning in the next few weeks. The Liberals and the NDP are refusing to give the people of Canada that voice on that decision.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Clark (Yellowhead): I know the NDP do not like making decisions; they have taken eight years to figure out their decision on NATO. But the Government of Canada—

Mr. Clark (Yellowhead): Do I now understand that the Liberal Party's official position is that they are prepared to let there be public debate and that they will give—
