Traffick, on which the *Profperity* of himfelf and his Family, perhaps *totally*, *depends*, it is but reafonable to expect their Sentiments should *clafb*.

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HENCE therefore fome have thought. That a Perfon of a liberal and learned Education. not concerned in Trade, is better qualified to engage in the Study of it as a SCIENCE, than a Merchant himfelf : because, fay they, his Mind is freer from the Prejudice of Self-Interest, and therefore more open to Conviction in Things relating to the General Good. They add, That though he may not understand the Buying and Selling of particular Commodities, or the fittest Time to bring them to a profitable Market, (which is the proper Province of a Merchant) yet he may understand, in what Respects the Nature of that Trade contributes to the Lofs or Gain of the Publick. with a Degree of Evidence, which perhaps the Merchant never thought of : as being indeed not concerned, merely as a Merchant, in fuch kinds of Disquisitions,

BUT without pretending to determine who are the best qualified to engage in the Study of this most useful and extensive Science, let Us rather humbly recommend it to the Attention of them both. For undoubtedly both have their Advantages; and perhaps the Application of both together, might be more succefsful
