

"While Ontario's lost agricultural population has gone to western Canada to build up English influence there, Ontario has become a hive of industry from the Ottawa to the Detroit River. Outside of Montreal and Sherbrooke what have we to show for the last three years?"

He says that Montreal taken out of this province Quebec would certainly be the tail of the confederation.
