## HORSES SELLING AT LOWER PRICES

Very Large Number Disposed of at the Repository—Some of the Buyers.

A very large number of horses were sold at the Repository yesterday, the sale being one of the most satisfactory of the season. About two hundred and fifty horses were offered for sale, and of these something like one hundred and fifty were sold. Still, horses are bringing high prices here, and are certainly selling in the market at Toronto cheaper by \$20 to \$50 per head than they can be bought for in the country. Many of the dealers bought these horses some time ago in expectation of a better market, and there has been, but after they have lifted their earlier purchases it is evident that they will not be prepared to sell at such high prices again in the near future.

A very large attendance of buyers was present at this auction at the Repository, but most of them seemed prepared to wait until rates are lower, when a big horse trade can be done. 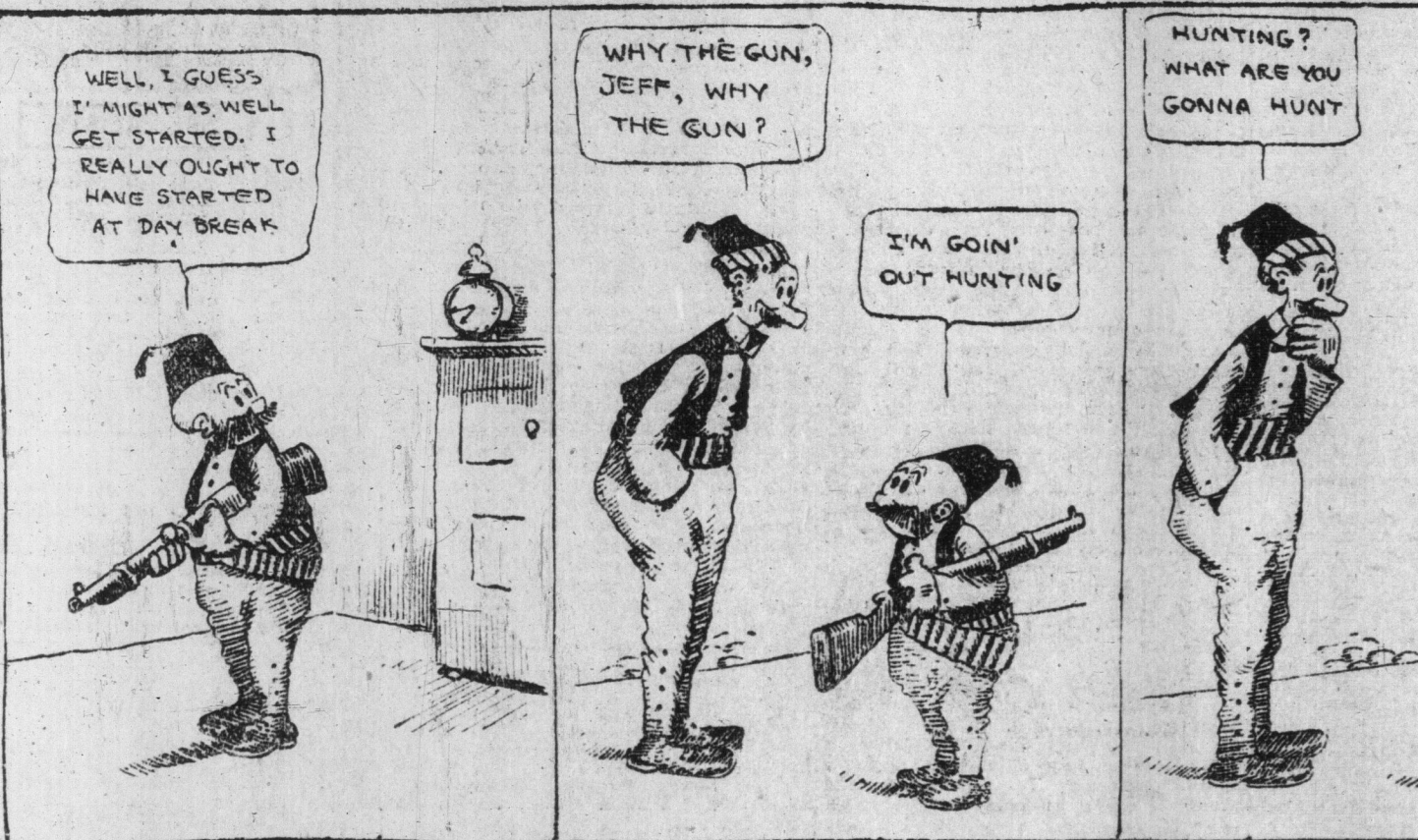
