Adding the amount of exemptions, namely, \$32,050, the net assessment is \$764,010.

This is the first time that an assessment has been made since the village was incorporated.

The population at present is almost 1000, but when the assessor's report is placed before the council, the questions of the township will be considered, together with the proposal of raising the village to the status of a town.
