SERBS DEFEAT BULGARS AND CHECK ADVANCE ON MONASTIR

GREEK CRISIS SAFELY OVER ALLIES' VIEW
King of Greece Reported to Have Given Satisfactory Assurances.

NO BLOCKADE ESSAYED
Britain Has, However Withdrawn Commercial Privileges From Greece.

SALONIKI, Nov. 22. - In view of the improvement in the relations of Greece and the entente powers. Danys Cochon, minister without portfolio in the French cabinet, abandoned his proposed trip to the front and left yesterday on board a Greek cruiser for Athens.

TIME TO GO AFTER ROYAL ENEMIES OF DEMOCRACY

We haven't the knowledge to advise in detail as to the situation in Greece; but what strikes us, and strikes a good many people on this side of the Atlantic, is that the chief offenders in the astounding situation in Europe today are the family of the Hohenzollerns of Germany, and the princes connected therewith, who have more or less to do with the public affairs of a number of other states in Europe; and that the issue which has been raised with such frightfulness as to policy and destruction of life and property has been raised by those who are in the king and prince business, and who are for cease and for military rule and autocracy, and overriding public rights and the rights of the common people.

BULGAR MOVE ON MONASTIR MEETS CHECK

Serbs and Austrians Both Make Claims of Important Victories.
TENACIOUS RESISTANCE
Austrian Statement Virtually Admits Bulgars Are Being Held Up.

LONDON, Nov. 22. - Reports concerning the fighting in the Balkans are more confusing than ever. The German accounts still claim progress for the Austro-German and Bulgarian troops, and recount the capture of thousands of prisoners and many guns from the Serbians. But from the towns mentioned their advance appears very slow. It may be, as reported from vital sources, that the campaign is waiting on a change in the disposition of the armies, so that the Germans may be left to enter Monastir. This would be a great trouble likely to arise thru Greek objection to Bulgarian occupation of the city, which is so near their border.

HALF MILLION FOR WAR LOAN

WINNIPEG, Nov. 22. - It was announced today that the Winnipeg sinking fund trustees will take \$500,000 of the war loan. Applications at the Winnipeg bank for allotments of the war loan were much larger today than yesterday.

PERSIA IS REPORTED IN STATE OF ANARCHY

WASHINGTON Hears Government Cannot Curb Troops of Various Nations.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 22. - Despatches of a semi-official nature received in Washington indicate that practically a state of anarchy exists in Persia. According to the reports troops of various nations are doing as they please in certain sections, the government being powerless to curb their action. Many government officials are said to have fled from the areas in which the most serious conditions prevail.

YOUTH FATALLY HURT IN RUNAWAY ACCIDENT

William Halsale Dies From Injuries in Woodstock Hospital.
WOODSTOCK, Nov. 22. - William Halsale, 19, died today from injuries received in a runaway accident on the Norwich road, Saturday night, while he was driving to the home of William Cayley, his employer, who lives near Holtville. He sustained two fractures of the leg and had a blood vessel burst. He was removed to the Woodstock Hospital. Death was due to loss of blood and shock.

DR. MACDONALD HAS RESIGNED
Announces Retirement From Managing Editorship of Toronto Globe.

SUCCESSOR APPOINTED

Stewart Lyon, Former Associate Editor, Advanced to Position.
After having been connected with the Toronto Globe in the capacity of managing editor for the past thirteen years, Dr. J. A. Macdonald has resigned from that position. FRENCH GUNS SILENCE GERMANS' ARTILLERY

Action Retarded on Whole Front by Fog—Mining in Argonne.
PARIS, Nov. 22. 10.35 p.m.—The following official communication was issued by the French war office tonight: "The day was calm on the whole front, the fog retarding the artillery action. Our batteries quickly silenced the enemy artillery, which attempted to destroy our trenches in the region of Rocourt, our positions between the Aisne and the Argonne, as well as in the region of Houyet, and in the Malancourt wood."

WILL ISSUE FULL LIST OF DOMINION'S GIFTS

A. Bonar Law Speaks of Intentions of British Government After War.
CANADIAN ASSOCIATED PRESS CABLE.

FOUR MILLION MORE BRITONS UNDER ARMS BY NEXT MARCH

ITALIANS LAND IN ALBANIA TO AID BALKAN CAMPAIGN

Allies' Attitude Toward Greece Decided Italy to Send Expeditionary Force and Action Followed Quickly.
UDINE, Italy, Nov. 23. - (Via Paris). - Italian troops have begun landing on Albanian territory, according to a Chiasso despatch to The Journal La Suisse, forwarded by the Central News correspondent at Zurich, Switzerland.

CHURCHILL IS ALREADY ON DUTY IN TRENCHES

LONDON, Nov. 22. - Correspondents with the British headquarters in France in their despatches announce that Winston Spencer Churchill, former Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, in the British Cabinet, already is on duty in the trenches. He is attached to the Grenadier Guards.

Kitchener Declares That Britain Will Have That Many More Soldiers Ready For the Field, and Will Equip Six Million Russians As Well.

PARIS, Nov. 22, 2.25 p.m.—Earl Kitchener, the British secretary of war, in conversation with Greek officials in his recent visit to Athens, is reported to have declared that England will have four million soldiers under arms and will be in a position to arm and provision six million Russians, and that consequently it would show great stupidity to think the war could end otherwise than in complete defeat for Germany.

CHECK GERMANS CARRY VILLAGE

THIRD DIVISION IS AUTHORIZED

MEN ARE OVERSEAS.

AWA, Nov. 22.—It is officially announced that a third Canadian division is being tendered to Great Britain by the Canadian Government, confirms rumors to that effect which were cabled from England last week. This will not entail the organization and enlistment of 25,000 men approximately required for the new division, as they are already enrolled and overseas.
