CHAPTER I.

Of the Origin of the Romans.

Question. Who were the ancient Romans?

Answer. The inhabitants of Ancient Rome, the chief city of Italy; the history of which is full of the most interesting and surprising events.

Q. From what people were the Romans descend-

ed?

A. From the ancient Latins, who inhabited the central part of Italy, which was called Latium; with these a people of Grecian descent, supposed to be the Tyrrhenian Pelasgi, appear to have been united; but the real nature of the circumstances under which the Roman people was formed is unknown, and the common account given by historians is evidently a fable.

Q. Whence do historians usually derive the ori-

gin of the Romans?

A. They assert that Æne'as, a Trojan prince, after the destruction of his native city, led a colony into Italy; that he was at first opposed by the native inhabitants, but finally obtained from King Lati'nus the hand of his daughter Lavinia, and the right of succession to the crown.
