All that can with propriety be observed by  
him is, that he has omitted nothing in his  
power to render it both the most useful and  
entertaining treatise that has hitherto ap-  
peared on this subject; to correct the errors  
of former writers; to supply the many defi-  
ciencies in their works; and to present the  
reader with a candid and impartial account of  
the various particulars constituting the pre-  
sent state of Great Britain.

He has endeavoured to give a satisfactory  
account of the name, situation, climate, and  
inhabitants of this Island; to delineate the se-  
veral counties, with accuracy; and to describe  
their rivers, air, soil, natural productions, ma-  
nufactures, and trade.

The constitution of Great Britain is amply  
discussed, its rise and progress from the re-  
mote times; and the power, prerogatives,  
council, and revenues of the King, are explained.

In considering the British parliament, par-  
ticular care has been taken to display the laws,  
customs, and privileges of that grand council  
of the nation; enumerate their methods of  
proceeding; and shew the manner in which  
the national business is transacted.

The various offices that compose the King's  
court are enumerated; and the power, and me-
