

W. D. ROBBINS IS NEW ALDERMAN

Light Vote in Ward One Elects
Street Railway Men's Secretary
to D. Chisholm's Unfinished
Term—Public Showed Little
Interest in Contest.

The returns from the 46 polling
booths tallied as follows:

BRITTON	224
GIBBONS	120
FIELDHOUSE	19

Returns secured from most of the
polling booths in Ward One give W.
D. Robbins a fair majority over his
three opponents in the aldermanic
contest for the seat left vacant by the
election of D. Chisholm to property
commissioner.

The vote was much less than half
that polled at the regular Ward One
election. During the morning but few
of the booths had even a half dozen
callers. At noon there was a fairly
good rush on the part of workmen
returning from employment, but as
the afternoon crept on the interest in
the election gradually dwindled away.

W. D. Robbins, the successful candi-
date, was seen by The World shortly
after the result of the polls was an-
nounced.

"I am immensely pleased with the
result," said Mr. Robbins, who is sec-
retary of the Street Railway Men's
Union. "The figures leave no doubt as
to whom the people wanted."
Mr. Robbins stated that as a railway
man he was most interested in labor
questions. "I stand for the appoint-
ment of a fair wage officer. I believe
that the Bloor-street viaduct should be
built, and Wilton-avenue extended."

A. E. DONOVAN TO GROW APPLES

Local Member for Brockville
Has Bought Thirty Acres,
and Will Plant Fruit
Trees.

The purchase has just been completed
by A. E. Donovan, M.L.A., of
thirty acres of land lying immediately
behind his house in Athens. Mr.
Donovan has just been making ex-
tensive improvements to his house and
premises there, and with the acqui-
sition of the extra thirty acres will have
quite an estate of his own. It is un-
derstood that Mr. Donovan will plant
his newly-acquired property with
fruit-trees, upon the latest scientific
plans, and will go in for growing ap-
ples extensively. The land is admir-
ably adapted for fruit culture and
should prove highly remunerative. Mr.
Donovan's fellow-member, Howard
Ferguson of Kempenfelt, for several
years past has had a new fruit farm
growing up alongside of his home on
the Rideau and has combined pleasure
and profit most satisfactorily. Mr.
Donovan expects to do the same. In
his work of development Mr. Donovan
has taken up his residence in Athens.
Mr. Donovan's example will supply
an interesting practical demonstration
of the possibilities of fruit-farming in
the section. Under proper methods
and with ordinary attention apple-
growing would be most remunerative.
The farther north, with reasonable
limits, that apples are grown, the bet-
ter they are. It would pay Leeds
and Grenville farmers to consider ap-
ple-growing more than they do at pre-
sent.

The property was purchased by Mr.
Donovan from Dr. Pratt, V.S., who is
going out west.

CANADIAN HORSE BREAKS RECORD

Confidence, Owned by Hon.
Clifford Sifton, at Cobourg
Saturday Exceeds Mark
by Wide Margin

COBOURG, Aug. 17.—(Staff Special.)
A Canadian horse exceeded the best
previous world's record for jumping at
the Cobourg Horse Show to-day.

Confidence, Hon. Clifford Sifton's
prize equine, which won the world's
championship for jumping over loose
poles at the London Olympia horse
show last spring, performed the feat.
The previous high mark was 7 feet
10 1/2 inches. Confidence on Saturday
jumped 7 feet 10 1/2 inches.

The horse, which was bred near Co-
bourg, was ridden by Jack Hamilton.
The opening event, open to all hunt-
ers which have not won a first or sec-
ond ribbon at this show, proved a nice
contest between Monty, a bay gelding
owned by Lieut.-Col. Cox, Oakville,
and ridden by Lieut. Gordon Myles,
and Temple Bar, a bay gelding entered
by the same owner and ridden by H.
Wilson; Dandy, a bay gelding owned
and ridden by Captain Walker Bell,
Windsor; Purvis, owned and ridden by
Lieut. W. B. Sifton, and Loreta, also a
Sifton horse. The contest resulted in
the first three horses mentioned in-
cluding in that order.

The event was over course "A." The
town of Galt furnished the winner in
this contest. Confidence, a bay gelding
owned by Hon. Clifford Sifton, was
ridden by Lieut. Gordon Myles, and
won the first prize and championship
ribbon. The contest was for all
hunters having won first or second
ribbons at the Cobourg Show. The
Viscount from Cork, a grey from the
Enniscorthy Farm was awarded the
reserve ribbon.

In the high jumpers' class, open to
horses and ponies, all round action to
be considered and performance only
to count. Masterpiece, a black gelding
owned by C. W. McLean, Prescott,
carried off first prize. Eastern Star, a
bay mare entered by the same owner,
was given second. Brookfield Lad, a
brown stallion owned by A. Yeager,
Simcoe, obtained third prize.

Man Winner.
The Cobourg Horse Show challenge
race cup goes this year to a Cobourg
horseman. Half a Crown, the eight-
year-old horse of R. F. Massie of Co-
bourg, overtook and winning from
Onapang, the Toronto horse, which led
until within about fifty yards of the
finish. The six-year-old Onapang was
ridden by Lyman Gooderman of To-
ronto, the owner, Lieut. Erick Skead
of the Toronto police, was riding the
winner. Marked for the race was
placed again. Lieut. Rawlinson finish-
ed the race on Circassian.
