DUST MULCH.

DUST MULCH. The surface of the ground in your war garden should never be crust is formed. Regular stirring of the top soil creates a perfect dust mulch, which is invaluable if you want successful growth. Ordinary dust mulch may be sup-plemented by the mulch of ma-nure or lawn clippings, which serves to keep down the small weeds and retain the soil moisture. It is doubtful if the heavier mulch is always beneficial to plants in cool locations. It keeps the ground rather cold, with the result that the invigorating influence of the surface.


