Hon. Dr. Cody Gives Address at Technical School Commencement Exercises.

DOMINION SHOULD HELP

Its Reconstruction Program Should Include Financial Help to Provinces.

The auditorium of the Toronto Technical School was filled last night, the ment exercises. Dr. McKay, the principal, was absent thru illness. The speaker of the evening was the minister of education. In introducing Dr Cody, Mr. Brigden said it augured well for him that he took such an interest in the technical education of Ontario.

Dr. Cody said that the unprepared state of the country for war had taught the country a lesson and that it should try now to be prepared for peace. The technical schools of the province were ready for the period of reconstruction; ready to take their place in working out the greatest problems that confronted the nation as a result of the war. "The fullest possible development of material and production must be maintained to its utmost," said Dr. Cody, "Wastefulness is a first rate national sin. People must be trained to be able to utilize their powers to the limit."

Practical Training Necessary.

The speaker expressed the opinion that a well-balanced education was necessary for effective workmanship. Practical training and book learning should never be divorced. He explained the different kinds of schools that made up the provincial system—elementary, secondary and technical. "In Ontario, technical and industrial schools are an integral part of our educational system," said the minister, "In this direction are we moving, and the time is ripe for a great forward step in technical schools."

He said, further, that, while the government gave all the help possible, it was left to the local authorities to give the broadest and most-needed kind of education in the district. He referred to all the help the department gives. "Our inspectors are not glorified detectives," he said. "They are helpers and inspirers, making their rounds to teach where they can and to improve the work."

The financial aspect of the new education came in for a share of talk. "The people of the province must make up their minds if they want technical education," said Dr. Cody. The Dominion Government, in connection with their reconstruction program, should help provide for the technical and industrial educational systems."
