**CHRISTMAS AT BARTLE.**  
Havana Post (Dec. 31, 1905).—Bartle has just celebrated his first Christmas. He is now a happy and prosperous New Year.

Flourishing in the gentle breeze of a lovely Cuban Christmas morning were the Cuban, American and Canadian flags, while the merry voices of the Cuban and Canadian boys, long accustomed to the severe winters of the north, set the Cuban boys laughing at their Cuban hosts and thanked God that they had at last found an earthly paradise.

The handsome hotel, tastefully decorated with royal palm leaves and other tropical plants, presented a beautiful appearance, especially at night when illuminated with numerous Chinese lanterns. The hall, however, was the scene of the principal festivities. It was an entrancing scene of tropical beauty with a Christmas tree in the center, surrounded by presents for the old and young.

While there were few who said they missed the wintry atmosphere with which Christmas has always surrounded them here, it was the general opinion that the time of goodwill to men was more enjoyable in the balmy air of Cuba than in the wintry blizzards of the north.

The children were delighted to meet Santa Claus one more, and he explained his presence by telling them that somehow or other the reindeer attached to his sleigh had carried many Americans in Cuba and had run off with him and had landed him at Bartle.

Three months ago, if you asked, "Where is Bartle?" few could tell you, but today, Christmas, 1905, he is known to everyone. It is about the youngest American-Canadian colony on the island, and judging from present indications, it is going to be the most successful. Situated on the Canagwegue, and only 110 miles east of Port of Antilla, on Nipe Bay, its location is a most excellent one. The soil and climate are the best that Cuba can give. Twenty-five thousand acres of magnificent land have been secured by the Cuban Realty Company, Limited, of Toronto and New York, and already there are eighty-two working, thirty colonists on the ground.

Bartle has a first-class hotel, two general stores and a saw mill in operation today, while in the beginning of the New Year, a large hotel is planned on a sugar mill with a daily capacity of 100 tons. The Cuban Railroad will shortly build a handsome new station, and all mail matter will be received daily from the railroad postal cars.
