Of the legislation enacted during the last session the education bill, and the act respecting the inspection and re-gistration of horses came in for some adverse criticism, but the course of the government generally was hearty endorsed.



President of Collingwood Board of Trade Points Out Injustice Done to Canadian Vesselmen.

Collingwood, Jan. 11.-(Special.)-President Paton of the Collingwood Board of Trade, in his annual address to that body, refers to many facts showing the fast growing importance of the town. Among other things he points out that the time has arrived when the Northern Navi-gation Co. should be asked to place a line of steamers between Collingwood and Lake Superior ports. The ship-yards are now the town's biggest industry, and a successful year is corded, "but," says Mr. Paton, corded, "but," says Mr. Paton, "it would appear at the moment that it is placed at a serious disadvantage by reason of the fact that it is subjected to the free competition of British built ships that are constructed in a country where labor, which is the largest item in the construction of a ship, is very much cheaper than in this country, and in view of this circumstance which apparently cannot be avoided, it would seem but fair and just that this very important infant just that this very important infant industry should receive a reasonable industry should receive a reasonable measure of assistance at the hands of the government in the form of a compensating bounty until such times as least as steel plates and other material used in the construction of ships are produced in this country, where we have the raw material in abundance."


