THE SHROPSHIRE SHEPHERDS

Annual Meeting of the American Association Held in Shaftesbury Hall Yesterday.

IMPORTATION FEES REDUCTION

Hon. John Dryden Re-Elected President of the Largest Live Stock Society on the Continent.

"Great are the Shropshire, the kings of all sheep," at least this was the opinion of all the members of the "American Shropshire Association" that held its annual meeting for the first time in Canada, in Shaftesbury Hall, yesterday.

The attendance was very good, and members of the association from all parts of America were there. This association is the largest live stock association in the world, and to an onlooker at their meeting the reasons readily suggest themselves. They are: 1. The capacity of their flocks; 2. The quality of all.

President's Address. The chair was taken by the president, Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, at 10.30 a.m.

He said the association was organized in 1884 on a very small beginning. Only seven were present at the first meeting. It was organized under the laws of Indiana, and the promoters little dreamt of what an extent the organization was to grow. This was the largest live stock association anywhere.

He gave reasons for the success of the association, among others, the politeness of the sheep, the harmony among the members, and the fact dealing toward all. The speaker advised all present to go up to the greatest exhibition on the continent.

The Secretary's Report. The secretary-treasurer, Mortimer Levering, Lafayette, Ind., read the minutes of the last meeting, which was held at Omaha. It had been the policy of the association to have their meeting at the time of a large show, which enabled them to see sheep and also to take advantage of cheap fares.

The report for the last year was read, but at the end of the fiscal year was not till Sept. 30, only a partial report was given. Every year the association advances over the previous one. In 1888 the sheep business in the States went down, but even then the association kept ahead. Since last meeting 102 memberships were issued, although 169 was the number last year, they expected to do better.

The certificates of registry issued were 25,000, pedigrees from Aug. 30, 1888, to Aug. 30, 1898, 12,117; the number of trans-acted was 2444. A published report will be sent to members at the end of the fiscal year.

Important Business. Several communications were read and left to the consideration of the executive. Mr. Charles Reinhold, Tiffin, Ohio, was suspended for having sold an animal without furnishing the register.

It was moved and carried that after Jan. 1, 1900, the fees on imported sheep be reduced from \$1 to 50c.

Officers Elected. The following officers were elected: President, Hon. John Dryden, Toronto; 1st Vice-President, Prof. W. C. Lott, Lafayette, Ind.; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Mortimer Levering, Lafayette, Ind.

Vice-Presidents: H. H. Clough, Ohio; George Allen, Illinois; Dr. G. H. Johnson, New York; T. A. Brier, Michigan; Richard Gibson, Canada; John I. Thompson, Indiana.

Committee on Pedigrees: E. G. Post, Ohio; W. J. Boynton, Minnesota; John Les-ter, Michigan; N. Greenhalgh, Quebec; Robert Miller, Brantford, Ont.; Morton Williams, Indiana.

The meeting adjourned at 1 p.m. to assemble at the call of the Executive.

JOHN COLE DROWNED.

Stumbled and Fell Into the Water at Owen Sound. Relatives Near.

Near Wiarton.

Owen Sound, Sept. 4.-A very sad drowning accident occurred here last night at midnight, when the workmen quit work at the C.P.R. docks. John Cole and others were coming along the dock, when Cole stumbled and fell into twenty feet of water. It being dark, the rescue was difficult, and life was extinct. The deceased was unmarried. His father is living in Kelly River district. His brothers and sisters live on the Bruce Peninsula north of Wiarton.

ALL FAVOR FEDERATION.

Victoria Shows a Large Majority in Favor of Australian Federation.

Brisbane, Sept. 4.-The latest but still incomplete returns of the voting on the Federal Referendum bill show a majority of 3180 in favor of federation.

A BAD BLAZE, THIS.

Fire Destroys 13 Business Houses and 25 Dwellings at Pinckney, Mich.

Bay City, Mich., Sept. 4.-At Peconing village, 20 miles north of Bay City, yesterday afternoon, fire destroyed thirty-two frame buildings, including the Michigan Central passenger station, Macabbee Hall, thirteen business houses and twenty-five dwellings. A heavy north wind prevailed and the fire was unable to cope with the flames. The fire stopped when it had burned itself out. The loss is roughly estimated at \$75,000, with small insurance.

CAPTURED A BULL CACT!

A Portion of Col. Bell's Regiment Met the Filipino Rebels Near Poroca.

Manila, Sept. 4.-Five men of Col. Bell's regiment yesterday encountered a rebel outpost near Poroca, and in the fighting which ensued one American was killed and another wounded. The remainder drove the rebels from their position and captured a bull cart, in which to remove the injured.

MRS. BERTHA HUGHES DEAD.

Her Right Leg and Arm Were Severed by the Montreal Express-Fall of Beer Near by.

Troy, N.Y., Sept. 4.-Mrs. Bertha Hughes, aged 25 years, was found lying on the railroad track at Fifth-avenue and Washington street about 4 o'clock this morning. She had been run over by the Montreal express, and her right leg and arm were severed. A man named Daniel Graham, partly clothed, and a pull of beer were found on the ground near by. The man was uninjured and claims to have no knowledge of the accident. The woman died at 9 o'clock.

A Coalition in Peru.

Valparaiso, Sept. 4.-The Peruvian Cabinet crisis has been solved by the formation of a coalition cabinet of which the following is the personnel so far as decided upon: President of Council, Senor Rafael Sotomayor; Minister of Foreign Affairs, Senor Grunewald; Minister of Finance, Senor Salinas; Minister of War, Gen. Concha.

Twenty Buildings Burned.

Port au Prince, Hayti, Sept. 4.-An incendiary fire in the Rue Republicaine today resulted in the destruction of 20 buildings. Two members of the fire department were injured in combating the flames.

Britain Has Not Weakened.

London, Sept. 4.-The British Foreign Office denies the statement, cable to a New York newspaper, that concessions in the Alaskan boundary question have been decided upon.

DEWEY AT GIBRALTAR.

The Usual Salute Was Fired and the British Battleship Devastation Returned the Compliment.

Gibraltar, Sept. 4.-The United States cruiser Olympia, with Admiral Dewey on board, which arrived here at 8.15 this morning, fired the usual salute in honor of the gunnery and compliment was returned by the batteries on shore and the British battleship Devastation.

Admiral Dewey is slightly indisposed at present and intends to live ashore during his stay here. At noon the American commander landed the batteries again saluted the second battalion of the Grenadier Guards in attendance. Admiral Dewey dined in the carriage of Gen. Sir Robert Blidgely, the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, to the palace for the purpose of paying Gen. Blidgely an official visit. The Olympia is expected to sail September 11th direct for New York.

Bush Fires Raging.

Warton, Ont., Sept. 4.-Bush fires are still raging all up through the Peninsula, William Gawley and A. Soddler, farmers of Easton, have been burned out, dwellings and barns, all they owned. The fires are still raging, and unless rain comes soon much valuable timber will be destroyed.
