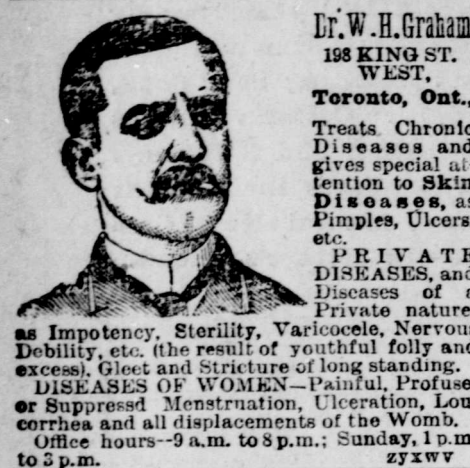

### AN ENDEAVORERS' RALLY

In South London. Reports of the Recent  
Ottawa Convention by Delegates.

Graphic reports of the recent Chris-  
tian Endeavor convention at Ottawa,  
were made by London delegates at  
Knox Church, South London, last  
night. About 200 Endeavorers gath-  
ered. The chair was taken by Mr.  
O. Leslie, first vice-president of  
the local union.

The president of the local union, Mr.  
Brown, was the first speaker, and he  
gave a capital review of the conven-  
tion, dwelling upon the necessity of  
individual responsibility to God. Miss  
Kirkpatrick, superintendent of Junior  
work, discussed that branch of Chris-  
tian Endeavor. Rev. Robert Johnston,  
who followed, said he loved to look  
into the faces of great crowds of  
young people, whose hearts were in-  
tense on extending the Kingdom of  
God. Mr. Johnston remarked that the  
work in London was not so prosperous  
as it had been, and he hoped better  
things were in store. They did not  
need a convention, so much  
talk, as they needed expense of work.  
The church choir, under Mr. F. L.  
Evans, rendered excellent music.

### SENATOR FERGUSON'S WILL.

The late Hon. Senator Ferguson,  
who died on Sept. 22 last, left a will  
he signed March 16 last, naming H. C.  
Symmes, of Niagara Falls; George  
Pattinson, of Preston; the widow, Mrs.  
Ferguson, and the son, Mr. R. F. Fer-  
guson, as the executors and trustees.

The entire estate is valued at \$131-  
652.79, apportioned as follows: Realty,  
\$32,200; household effects, \$1,000; debts  
and notes, \$200; mortgages, \$17,324.79;  
life insurance, \$18,000; shares and  
stocks, \$16,378; other property, \$46,550.  
The realty consists of the family resi-  
dence on Glen road, Rosedale, \$24,000,  
mortgaged for \$1,150; two properties  
in London, Ont., \$8,500; property in  
Vancouver, \$25,356; mortgaged for  
\$13,156.

The sister, Rebecca, gets \$200; the  
son, William, is given the watch chain  
and pendants belonging to his father  
and the plate presented to the senator  
by his Wolland constituents. Mrs.  
Ferguson is given the Rosedale resi-  
dence, with all its contents; should  
she marry again she must then yield  
possession. One of the London houses  
goes to a sister, Mary McLean, and  
the other to another sister, Jane Sho-  
botham.

The trustees are to carry on the  
business of Ferguson & Pattinson, at  
Preston, and they have full power in  
this matter. Then one-third of all  
the estate is given to the widow, one-  
third to the son, Wm. F., who is to  
have \$500 a year until he is married  
or becomes 30 years of age. One-  
third is given to the daughter, Mary  
Victoria Beatrice, who is to have \$200  
a year until she is married, and then  
power is given to give her what she  
deems best until the daughter is 25.
