The West Elgin Frauds. It hardly needed Mr. Macnish's state-

ment, on oath, that he had not advised, and was ignorant of the extraordinary and improper means taken to secure his election in West Elgin. The majority was so large that it seems probable he would have been elected even had no such extraordinary methods by outside heelers been employed. At the same time, it may be fairly said that it was his duty, and will hereafter be his duty, as a contemporary puts it, "to keep a very vigilant eye on what is going on in his own camp." In censuring Sheriff Brown for the grave errors into which he fell as returning officer the judges but expressed public opinion. The Advertiser does not believe in calling that white which is black. Whether it is in the appointment of individuals with assumed names to act as deputy returning officers and the like, as in West Elgin, or the wicked throwing out in London of 51 votes cast for a Liberal candidate-no matter what it is that prevents a fair election, it is to be condemned in the first place as wrong, and in the second as shortsighted, and in the nature of a boomerang.

Perhaps we may be allowed to say there is little obvious advantage in partisans of the pot calling partisans of the kettle black. The great bulk of the electors of both parties desire honest and fair elections. It is the considerable middle-handful of purchaseable votes that constitute the difficulty. A remedy must be found for electoral corruption, and we have no doubt a remedy can and will be found. Let the leading men on both sides of the House get together in committee; let them obtain suggestions from wise judicial experts; and our word for it, if they honestly and unitedly desire to put a stop to evil doing in electoral contests, both as a wrong and a nuisance, a way will be found. But as the evil is not confined to one party alone, neither can the cure come alone from either one of the two political parties,

In a Suit to Recover Insurance on Her Murdered Boy's Life.

Montreal, June 28 .- Judge Lemieux delivered judgment yesterday in the case of Mrs. Poirier vs. the Standard Life Assurance Company in favor of the plaintiff.

Mrs. Poirier is the mother of the man who was murdered at St. Canut by his wife, Cordelia Viau, and Sam Parslow, both of whom were hanged, and she sued the company to recover \$2,000 insurance on her son's life.
