—Miss May Blossom Evans, of In-lac Center, Mich., and Miss Jessie Black, of St. Marys, were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar A. Evans, 350 Lyle street, for the past few days.

—Stratford Beacon: It is rumored around town that in case Rev. J. W. Bradley, of London, accept the call to Toronto, Rev. Mr. McKenzie, of this city, may be asked to take his place.

—After a brief consultation with the water commissioners yesterday morning, Engineer Moore left for Montreal, while there will lay the report of Engineer Jones before Engineer Kennedy.

—Mr. Walter Leadley, private secretary for the chief of mounted police at Calgary, aged 24, died suddenly Thursday last from bleeding of the lungs. He was a son of Mrs. Thomas Leadley, living on the town line of Lobo and Williams. He was a clever young man, and highly thought of by his many friends.

—John Gowllett, of lot 23, con. 1, London township, has been arrested on a charge of wrongfully taking possession of an organ belonging to Miss Frances Goble. —The congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church met in the North End Mission last night and ratified the sale of the old church property for \$8,100. The managers were empowered to raise \$17,000 by mortgage on the new building. The managers have already made arrangements with the Huron and Erie for the loan of any amount not exceeding \$17,000, at 4½ per cent. It is expected that not more than \$15,000 or \$16,000 will be required.

CHURCH CHANGES.

The following changes and appointments, following the promotion of Mr. McEvay to the bishopric of London have been made by the Bishop of Hamilton: Rev. Father Slaven, of Galt, has been chosen to succeed Mr. McEvay as a member of the bishop's diocesan council, and appointed pastor of the parish of Dundalk, Froton and Melancthon. Rev. Father Craven, hitherto administrator of St. Patrick's Church, Hamilton, has been appointed pastor of Galt, Preston and Hespeier. Rev. Father Colly, administrator of Dundalk, succeeds Father Craven as administrator of St. Patrick's. Rev. Father O'Reilly, of St. Patrick's, has been transferred to St. Basil's Church, Brantford. Father Doyle, of St. Basil's, transferred to St. Patrick's. Hamilton. Rev. Father Mahony is appointed administrator of St. Mary's Cathedral. Rev. Father Holden appointed chancellor of the diocese. Rev. Dr. Walter appointed bishop's secretary. Rev. Father Donovan, transferred from Dundas to the cathedral staff. Rev. Father Cleary, who has been lent to London, returns to Hamilton diocese with the Vicar-General Keenan, of Dundas.

DEMOCRATIC REPRESENTATION.

The special committee on districts of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, which met at Hamilton last week, evolved a plan of district representation, whereby the Dominion will be divided into six districts, and the district council meetings will be formed by representatives from each council in the district, such district councils to send a certain number of representatives to the grand council in due course. The grand council will be composed of a body of about 70 in all, and the grand officers will be entitled to a voice, but no vote, thus making it a most democratic representation, as the business of the order and the legislation passed will be very properly dealt with through the representatives direct from the councils interested. It also provides that only eight grand officers shall be elective and returned to the grand council by virtue of their office, the minor officers being appointed, and their terms of office expiring the day before the next session of the grand council. It furthermore provides that only three grand officers shall be ex-officio members of the executive committee, and four grand representatives shall be elected on said committee, thus giving a fair representation from the floor of the house on said committee. At present the said 48 representatives to the grand council.

TALKING OF RETALIATION

Michigan Lumbermen Stir Up the U. S. Secretary of the Treasury.

An Ex-Parte Statement of the Lumber Question.

[Special to The Detroit Free Press.] Washington, D. C., July 24.—Since it became apparent that the joint high commission would not meet in August, and, indeed, might never reassemble, the Michigan lumbermen interested in Canadian stumpage purchased by them prior to the recent act prohibiting the exportation of logs have begun to flood the treasury department with demands that the administration shall now carry out the project announced several weeks ago of retaliating upon Canada by the imposition of a prohibitory duty on all items of the lumber schedule coming from Canadian territory. It is pointed out in these communications, which are addressed to the secretary of the treasury, that the lumber interests affected have refrained from any agitation of the subject so long as it seemed possible that the joint high commissioners might reconvene. There was no disposition, it was asserted, to permit private interests to embarrass the administration in its negotiations and the lumbermen owning Canadian stumpage have patiently permitted their mills to lie idle, and their capital to remain unproductive through semi-diplomatic negotiations.

It is now maintained, however, that there is no longer any prospect of an agreement by the joint high commission concerning either the lumber question, the Alaska boundary, or any other of the numerous disputes relegated to the commission for consideration. It now seems apparent, therefore, that if the lumber interests are to secure relief it must be through the adoption of a policy of retaliation that shall touch Canada in her most sensitive point—her pocket. The secretary has therefore been urged to lose no time in imposing the proposed prohibitory duties, which it is held only need to be promulgated by the president to become a law of the land.

The position of the administration is rendered not a little embarrassing by the receipt of these demands at this time. These letters were written before the recent significant speeches in the House of Commons at Ottawa were delivered, but their effect taken in connection with the declarations of Sir Charles Tupper and Premier Laurier has been to convince administration officials that the situation in which the United States, Great Britain and Canada are rapidly becoming involved is of much gravity. AN EXPLANATION.

The Detroit Free Press goes on to say: It transpires that the sudden ad-

journalment of the high joint commission in February was the result of the inability of the American and Canadian commissioners to agree upon the manner of disposing of this one subject [the Alaska boundary line]. The British side proposed arbitration; the Americans agreed to the general proposition, but suggested certain modifications. These were not acceptable to the British commissioners, who stopped the negotiations and referred the matter to the home government, having refused to go on with the other subjects until the Alaska question was disposed of. Thus, the commission adjourned under somewhat strained relations.

Under the modus vivendi which was proposed in June with every prospect of acceptance, but which is still awaiting the signatures of the two nations, the provisional boundary line was fixed between Alaska and Canada at three points near the head of the Lynn Canal. These would be sufficient to prevent any further conflicts. These points are as follows: On the White Pass, at the old Canadian custom house in the pass; on the Chilcoot Pass, likewise at the Canadian custom house, which has existed for the past eighteen months; on the Dalton trail, just above the Indian village of Kluckwan.

The first two points are easily fixed; the hitch of the moment has been over the location of the divisional point on the Dalton trail. The point named is at the head of canoe navigation, and fifteen miles above tidewater, which the Canadians sought so strenuously to reach.
