MUTINY AT PORTSMOUTH; 600 SAILORS RUN AMUCK

Officer Orders Front Rank to Kneel and Jack Tars Resenting It Start Serious Outbreak.

Portsmouth, England, Nov. 5. - A mutinous outbreak on the part of five or six hundred sailors last night necessitated the immediate mobilization of the entire force in the naval barracks here in order to prevent the affair from developing into a serious mutiny The men had assembled in the gymnasium, when the senior officer, a man of short stature, wishing to administer a reprimand for breach of discipline, ordered the front ranks to kneel so that he could see the men in the rear. The order was resented, and some of the sailors who refused to obey were arrested. Their comrades, aggrieved, ran amuck, wrecked the canteen and other premises, started to break out of barracks, with the intention of wrecking the quarters of the obnoxious ofncer, and were only prevented from so doing by the fixed bayonets of an overwhelming force. A number of the men who attempted to break out of barracks also were arrested.

The areas that will be thus sealed and abandoned are very considerable. On the 2,600-foot level a section half a mile long by 600 feet wide is gone, and on the 3,200-foot level a section three quarters of a mile long by 400 feet wide is sealed, and the two districts comprise very valuable producing portions of the colliery.

> The company will keep the men at work night and day in the remaining portion of the mine, both in the raising of coal and the developing of new sections, and in course of a comparatively short time the colliery will likely be producing as much coal as ever.

The total number of employes, men and boys at the Springhill collieries is 1,760, andthe pay roll amounts to between \$35,000 and \$40,000 every fortnight.
