HAYWOOD TELLS

Declares Orchard's Confession implicating Him to Be False.

Boise, Idaho, July 11.-Wm. D. Haywood took the oath today as a witness in his own defense, and in a lengthy narrative of his life work as a leader of his fellow-miners, which was interrupted by adjournment, denied guilt of the murder of Steunenberg and the manifold crimes charged against him by Harry Orchard.

Haywood was pale and trembled with nervousness when he left the table of his counsel for the witness-stand. quiet: hese died, 5s ½d: old tions his voice was low and somewhat 2½d. Fatures quiet: July uncertain, but within ten minutes he had regained his composure.

Haywood's direct testimony today was characterized chiefly by positive denials of allegations made against him by the prosecution. He denied that he met Orchard until some time after the Vindicator mine explosion: denied that he sent Orchard back to Cripple Creek to blow up the Independence station; denied participation in the murder of Detective Gregory and denied suggesting or discussing the Steunenberg murder. He swore that he never gave Orchard any money at any time or any place for any purpose. He declared that he never made a threat against Steunenberg. He said he saw Orchard for the last time in August, 1905, when Orchard told him he was going to Alaska. The direct examination has not

reached the connection of Jack Simpkins with the federation and the action of the federation after Steunenberg was murdered when court adjourned.
