

WILL RUSH COURT CASES TO RELEASE MEMBERS OF JURY

County Sittings Will Be Held
Night and Day.

In view of the heavy list of cases set down for hearing at the county court sittings that open next Tuesday before Judge Talbot Macbeth it is expected long sessions will prevail.

Judge Macbeth has been requested by the minister of justice to shorten the time that the jurors will be away from their farms as much as possible. There are at present six civil and six criminal cases entered for trial by jury. Five non-jury civil actions are listed, making a total of seventeen cases entered to date.

Judge Macbeth will, it is understood, adopt the plan being followed in other counties of holding court day and night until the jurors are released from duty.

Four of the criminal cases are theft charges laid against William Summers, J. Onga, Boyd Temple and William Delaney. Frank Polmann will answer to charges of fraud and forgery, and J. Weir of London Township to assault. The preliminary hearing in the last-named case will take a few days ago before C. W. Hawkshaw of Lucan.

**YOUNG DOCTORS TRY
COUNCIL EXAMS AT
VICTORIA HOSPITAL**

Centre System in Force for First Time This Year.

The provincial association of the Ontario Medical Council were completed on Tuesday at Victoria Hospital, there being fifteen candidates in the class. In previous years these examinations were held at Toronto, but this year examining centres were held at Toronto and London for the province. The results will not be out until June 1. The examining board was as follows: Surgery, Dr. Clout, Ottawa, and Dr. Hodgins, London; medicine, Dr. Vrooman, Nanaimo, and Dr. Connell, Kingston; gynecology, Dr. E. Williams, London, and Dr. Mitchell, Toronto.

The written exam. papers were sent to Toronto to be marked, and the oral and clinical examinations were conducted at Victoria Hospital during the past week by the above medical men. Dr. R. Ferguson of this city presided at the examinations.

CHIEF JUSTICE'S IRE**

Someone residing at the head of Paul
street, Wm. London, has blocked the
way leading to Edinburg street, on the
top of the hill, by the erection of a

Meredith, brother of the chief justice.

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QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

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Will Be Answered From Official
Information by The Advertiser.

Anxious, Q.—Would a man who
has attained the age of 20 this
month and married after July 6,
1917, have to register in the 1920-
21 draft? If so, must he report
before he is married?

A.—If he was married after April 20,
1918, he will be considered single for
purposes of classification, and will have
to register.

St. Thomas, Q.—I am 19 years
of age. Will I have a chance to
choose a unit after June 1?

A.—Are the batteries recruiting? If
not, when will they?

**3. After I am drafted, can I transfer
from one unit to another?**

**4. Are there any exemptions for
men in lower category A 2?**

**5. Are they accepting recruits in
the navy for home defence?**

A.—1. No announcement has been
made, but you probably will.
2. No; but when more men are needed,
you might, though you must report
before notified to claim the choice of
units.

**3. There are no exemptions for men
of that age. They may obtain leave of
absence under certain conditions.**

**4. Yes. Write to the naval recruiting
officer, 103 Bay street, Toronto.**

G. R. Q.—1. A medical student of
military age who left Ontario with a
passport in September, 1917, and
returned in October, 1917, and who
is now attending college in the
United States, has completed the
year's work, and has now returned
until the college work begins in the
fall; in the meantime will work on
farm. What should he do now that
he has returned in order to place
himself in proper position under the
military service act? If he should
report to the military authorities
and a medical examination be made,
the fact that he has only a thumb
and one finger on one hand, would
likely cause him to be placed
lower than in A or B class? What
are his chances to be allowed to re-
turn and continue his medical
studies? What papers should he
carry on him now?

A.—1. He should report by mail to
the deputy registrar, Royal Bank Build-
ing, London, Ont., and claim exemption
under 1. He should then be prob-
ably referred to a tribunal and asked
probably to a medical board. No at-
tempt can be made in this column
to reply as to probable medical category.
If he is exempted, or is categorized low,
he may be allowed to go back.
2. He could apply for a passport in the
usual way, and he will then be in-
formed as to what additional steps are
necessary. It is impossible to state what
stand the immigration officials might
take. He should carry a photograph of
a certified copy of his marriage license.

L. A. D. Q.—Could a person 19
years of age, who is to be married
June 1, obtain separation allow-
ance? If so, how much?

A.—Yes. Anyone married before be-
ing ordered to report can secure it for
his wife, \$25 per month for a private's
wife, and higher according to rank.

M. A. S. Q.—A young man was
22 years of age on April 3, 1918.
May 28 last he was ordered to re-
port for duty, and on March 26 got
his discharge as unfit for military
service. Should he get a war service
badge? If so, to whom should he
write?

A.—1. He is liable to be again called
for duty.
2. He would be entitled to a Class
D badge, but no more D badges are
issued at present. He can apply to
Major C. O. Fairbank, Volunteer Bar-
acks, London, Ont.

**Yes. Anyone who has not served
in an actual theatre of war must regis-
ter and comply with the provisions of
the act. The discharges are only pro-
visional.**

Watford, Q.—1. Is the A. M. C. or
the A. S. C. recruiting?
2. If I register now, can I get my
choice of units after June 1?
3. Do you get notice to register?

A.—1. You might, though you can be sure
to get choice by joining before June 1.
2. No; you must mail your name, ad-
dress and date of birth to the deputy
registrar at London.

H. G. Q.—1. What are the duties of
Canadian Engineers?
2. Is it possible to get into the
Army Medical Corps in any military
category in Canada?

**3. Are men over 23 years of age
who have been exempted from com-
batant service likely to be called
soon? If so, for what branches of
the service?**

A.—1. It is possible for a man who is
working in London military district,
but whose home is in Forest Hill, to
be called for service in the military
district to report for duty in
Toronto rather than in London?

A.—1. The construction of buildings,
roads, bridges, etc., in Canada, England
and France.
2. They are likely to be called for
non-combatant service, such as in the
Canadian Engineers, the Railway Con-
struction Corps, the Canadian Railway
Employees, the Army Medical Corps,
etc.

3. He can report in either.

W. J. O. Q.—1. Will a boy of 19
years who is drafted have a medical
examination?
2. Will a boy who enlists have a
medical examination?
3. Are drafted boys, 19 years old,
and enlisted boys, 19 years old,
treated equally regarding their
board and work?

A.—1. It is true that the officers treat
drafted boys cruelly and spare en-
listed ones under the same circum-
stances.

**5. To whom would a person write
for information as to the conditions
on which a boy of 19 would be al-
lowed to remain on the farm?**

A.—1. A 2 and 3. Yes.

**5. He may get leave of absence if he
is less than category A, or if he has
members of his family in the mili-
tary, or if serious hardship would be
the result of his being drafted. In such cases
as those in which the boy is called in the
sole support of a widow, an invalid
father, or other helpless dependents.**

A. C. Q.—Can a young man on a
farm, who is the support of aged
parents, the rest being away from
home—claim exemption?

A.—Yes, unless he is over 23 years
when he filled out his application for
exemption in the postoffice. If he can-
not, or if he is excluded, he might get
leave of absence on those grounds.

J. F. C. Q.—What does the work
of the Skilled Railway Employees
consist of? Where could one apply
for enlistment?

A.—The operation of railways in
France. Apply to Capt. F. O. Canfield,
officer commanding the Service Com-
pany, Canadian Engineers, Carling
Heights Camp, London, Ont.
