

MAKING CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS A POSSIBILITY.

The voting of \$100,000 by the Ontario Government towards making conolidated schools in Ontario a possibility, will no doubt prove a great impetus in his direction throughout the province. For, although the amount seems very small, when viewed in the light of the hundreds of large, well-equipped buildings which will be necessary, before the system is complete, it is big enough to solve the chief difficulty in question—that is, the transportation of pupils from all parts of the district terms. parts of the district to the community school.

Just as the modern house has outgrown the spinning wheel, so has the farm listrict outgrown the old, pioneer, one-room school. The consolidated school alms at giving all the advantages of a city school, in the country district, and ius placing a good education within the reach of every farm boy and girl. And not only does this type of school make a good education possible, but ere is a movement on foot at the present time to frame the educational sysem in such a way that courses leading to the profession of farming will be stituted in the schools. And the practical part of farming will be considered the curriculum.

The consolidated school is but the first step in the centralizing of the activies of the country district. Some very advanced persons go so far as to suggest ne community building, housing the school, church and auditorium. But whatever may come eventually, the first step has been taken, in the granting of 100,000 to make consolidated schools a possibility.
