Non-Transferable.

These tickets would be presented to the Government vendor, and the required lictor obtained. The cards are to be issued under Government regulations, and in his opinion should be non-transferable, allowing no loophole for those wishing to abuse the privilege

for those wishing to abuse the privilege and inflicting heavy penalties on any infringers apprehended.

Time Limit.

The "wet" ration cards could be issued monthly, to be utilized in a stipulated time, otherwise they become void, thus cutting off all possibility of some persons hoarding their cards for a big time. The cards for liquor should be optional, and those not availing themselves of the opportunity of obtaining same, would not thereby give others a chance to reap a further supply.

Only Heads of Home Eligible.

In obtaining the booze, card-holders would have to prove identity. In case, giving every adult a ration card, would be opposed on the ground that too much liquor would be dispensed for the welfare of the province, the former hotelkeeper suggests, that only the heads of the house be allowed to draw cards, thus limiting each family to perhaps one quart of whiskey monthly, and eliminating the necessity of doctors' prescriptions.

The school for the professional training of librarians which opened in Toronto was addressed by Hon. Dr. Cody, minister of education, during the afternoon session. A modern library is not merely to be a receptacle for books, but a means of circulating books, and is an integral part of public education. He stated that no system of education is complete that does not take into account opportunities for the adult population—for those who are not taking formal school training. There are two kinds of education, said Dr. Cody, "that which is given to a person, and that which he attains himself," the latter being the kind that counts most after all. The library is an institution for the encouragement of self-culture and self-help, and the advancement of the library cause deserves every commendation. The minister spoke of the value of professional training in librarianship as being the most important contribution to library efficiency.
