HAMILTON, Dec. 2.—(Special)—The Conservative delegates from ward seven selected their candidates for the council this evening, this completing the party slate which is as follows: Ward one—Ald. Parrar, Sackville Hill, and W. O. Menger, Ward two—Ald. Elmer, W. J. South, and G. E. Bird, Ward three—Ald. Nicholson, ex-Ald. Bird and Dr. A. Langrill, Ward four—Ald. Allan and Clark and Charles I. Ennis, Ward five—Ald. J. Wright, ex-Ald. Kennedy and George Hill, Ward six—Ald. Juttin and Howard, and Dr. Hookins, Ward seven—Ald. Anderson, A. M. Ewing and C. H. Brayley. A committee of the general executive was named to report on the slate and to recommend changes that they may see fit.

ST. ALBAN'S CATHEDRAL

A Statement as to the Financial Condition.

E. M. Chadwick, treasurer of the St. Alban's Cathedral Chapter, has, with the sanction of the archbishop, issued a statement of the financial affairs of the cathedral. The sale of 200 feet of the school grounds realized \$35,000 gross, but \$800 had to be deducted on liabilities. A practical view of the situation is that this \$34,200 net will get the school building and the land in which it stands.

The opening of the futile negotiations by the board of education for this property caused the work of the committee in obtaining subscriptions to be delayed. It is expected, however, that the committee will take up the work again shortly.

Last year the indebtedness of the chapter was reported as \$54,000, with interest from the time payment of the mortgage was called for to June 19, 1935, \$20,812.20, or \$74,812.20 in all. On this there was paid by the laymen's committee \$74,812.20, and is provided for by the debt process of sale, \$25,000.00; and subscriptions not yet paid, about \$50,000.00, totaling \$124,812.20. Of the above unpaid subscriptions some were subscribed conditionally and may not become available.

At the time the debt is now a small one compared with the value of the property, estimated at \$100,000, the annual charges are beyond the present resources of the chapter, who are therefore dependent on the aid of the people of the diocese. It is pointed out that if the debt is a diocesan one and there is any way of the church or of the diocese is a debtor for his share of it.
