

## GINNELL AGAIN IN TOILS OVER IRISH QUESTION

Nationalist Member of Parliament is Arrested Second Time.

### BAKER SHOT AT DOOR

Land Line Across Country Cut But Repaired in Twenty-Four Hours.

Dublin, March 27.—Laurence Ginnell, nationalist member of the house of commons for the north division of West Meath, was arrested today for the second time by the military and police. Mr. Ginnell was previously arrested in 1917 for contempt of court and on conviction was sentenced to six months' imprisonment. He served the term at the jail in Dublin.

**Warning of Attack.**  
Thurles, County Tipperary, Ireland, March 27.—James McCarthy, a youthful baker, was called to the door of his home early this morning and shot down. The victim recently received a warning that he would be attacked. McCarthy's brother declared that several men surrounded the house and fired on his sister as she was running for a priest and a doctor.

**SEA CABLE SAFE**  
New York, March 27.—The Commercial Cable Company announced here today that a land line thru Ireland, supplementing its transatlantic cables, was cut Thursday and repaired within 24 hours.

A report from Paris, that one of its deep sea Atlantic cables passing thru Ireland had been cut, was untrue, it added.

## VOLUNTEER TROOPS LEAVE S. RUSSIA

Bolsheviks Capture Enemy's Last Base—Cossack Outrages in Daghestan.

Constantinople, March 27.—General Baron Wrangel, commander of the volunteer army in south Russia, has come across the Black Sea from the Novorossiysk region, and is now on the island of Samos. He visited Constantinople before proceeding to Pimpino.

The Russian volunteer army has been driven out of the anti-Bolshevik front in southern Russia, and his general staff, have been at Novorossiysk since March 14. The Cossack forces still number about 6000. All the foreign missions have evacuated Yekaterinodar, in Circassia, near the eastern coast of the Black Sea, and a short distance from Novorossiysk, but apparently they are organized Bolshevik force within 40 miles of that city, altho bands are making trouble by interfering with the communications.

**Moslems Passive.**  
The Daghestan government in the Caucasus is dominated by Mohammedans, who are so outraged at the seizure of the Caucasus by the Bolsheviks, they are reported to have made an agreement not to oppose the Bolshevik advances toward the Caspian Sea.

Uncertainty still prevails as to what will be the attitude of the Azerbaijan government toward Persia, but it is rumored that the Turkish Nationalists have influenced Azerbaijan in favor of the Bolsheviks.

It is said here that the remnants of Denikine's forces in South Russia, will retire to the Caucasus where it is thought possible they can make an effective resistance against the Bolsheviks.

**Take 1000 Prisoners.**  
London, March 27.—A Bolshevik communication received by wireless last night from Moscow says:

During the occupation of Kholmays we took more than 1000 prisoners and 14 guns and scores of machine guns. These were captured mainly by a Ulan regiment which only the previous day had passed to our side. Two thousand Kuban Cossacks have joined us near Smolenskaya.

"We entered Grosny (Dagestan) March 24. The oil wells had not been damaged."

**Denikine Worried.**  
London, March 27.—Russian Novorossiysk, the last base in southern Russia under control of General Denikine, has been captured by the Russian Bolsheviks, according to a wireless despatch from Moscow.

**MONTREAL AMUSEMENTS MUST CLOSE SUNDAYS**

Montreal, March 27.—By an order issued today by the provincial attorney-general's department, all places of amusement where admission is charged for must in future be closed on Sunday. Hitherto, poolrooms, moving picture houses, vaudeville theatres and concert halls have been allowed to do a regular business on Sunday.

## FIVE OF THE LEADERS ARE FOUND GUILTY

(Continued from Page 1.)

The crowd, the sheriff and his men were hissed and booed.

Attack Deputy Sheriff.

Somebody hit Deputy Pynter a fist blow.

A couple of the constables struck back into the crowd and it looked for a moment as if there would be a riot.

After ten minutes the deputy sheriff and constables succeeded in clearing the hall and drove the crowd into the street.

The accused all accepted the verdict quietly.

Heaps showed no elation over his acquittal.

Relatives of the men found guilty were in the courtroom were deeply affected by the verdict.

When the first verdict of guilty was announced in the case of William Lyons, a suppressed groan arose from the crowd and as the other verdicts followed, the wives of the several men who were in various parts of the courtroom broke down one after the other.

**Threaten Jurymen.**

The accused were remanded for sentence for ten days without bail.

They were taken to the jail after having a few moments' conversation with their relatives.

A large crowd was assembled outside the court house and in the lower hall.

The crowd made a demonstration against the jurymen who left the building by a side exit.

The trial has been in progress for more than two months and during all that time, the jurymen have been kept away from the public.

They were discharged when their verdict had been received.

R. A. Bonnar, counsel for Bray, asked for a reserved case for all those who were found guilty.

He also asked if the men could be let out on bail until this point was decided.

Mr. Bonnar was in consultation with A. J. Andrews, crown counsel, on the question of a remand until Wednesday for sentence.

At 2.10 this consultation was proceeding in private.

**Reserve Case Granted.**

Following the rebuttal address by A. J. Andrews, K.C., senior crown counsel, yesterday, Mr. Justice McCall, at 4.30, announced his charge to the jury, not concluding till half an hour after midnight, when the jury retired to consider their verdict.

Objections to the charge were made by W. E. Trueman, K.C., who applied for a reserve case.

The application was granted by his lordship, and the court was adjourned till 11 this morning.

The court was crowded, and the lengthy address by the judge was followed with the most intense interest.

In his charge, the judge went minutely into the law regarding the offences charged, and into the evidence, and was apparently quite exhausted when his task was completed.

Regarding the law his lordship asserted:

"Our question is—are these men guilty, under our law, of doing or going among others to do, or cause others to do the unlawful acts charged. That is a question of justice, which is bound by the law as it stands, and not by the law as the accused say it ought to be. Therefore, we have nothing to do with the supposed law of natural justice, unless it be a part of the law of the land."

**Must Administer Law.**

Having stated that it was parliament that made the law and amended it as was thought proper, his lordship declared that until the law was amended it must be administered as it was.

"Otherwise," he advised, "we would have mob rule and chaos."

As for the theories of strikers as to greater privileges, these must be given up. This is a court of justice, who set forth the law in respect of the charges, and asked the jury to decide whether or not it had been broken by the accused.

**Jury Long Deliberated.**

The jury in whose hands now rested the case of the crown against the seven leaders, had not agreed on a verdict at 11.10 this morning, and court was adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The jury reported to the court at 11.10 that they had not been able to agree upon a verdict and asked his lordship for further instructions. The judge replied that he was unable to add to his charge.

## CONFLICTING NEWS

Headquarters, at Duisberg

Have No Definite Information.

Amsterdam, March 27.—Telegraphing from Dusseldorf after a visit to headquarters and the front of the Red army in the Ruhr district, the correspondent of the Amsterdam Handelsblad says:

"At general headquarters of the revolution, which is at Duisberg, nobody seems to know exactly what is happening at the front. Some say there has been no fighting for some time, while others declare the fighting has not stopped."

"The Red troops go from their homes to the front at their own will and fight for a while, and then return home to sleep and eat a bite."

"The Reds are a heterogeneous mass, wearing red armbands, ribbons or neckties. Some of them have red shirts. The only thing in common to all is that they carry rifles. While the rest of the world uses such terms as 'government troops,' 'Spartacists,' and the like, in the fighting area everyone speaks only of 'Noskes,' which includes all varieties of the former class, and 'Carabines,' which includes all Reds. It is a war of Noskes against the Carabines."

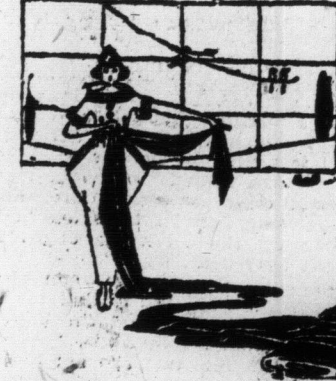

## PROBE ADMINISTRATION OF ASSINIBOIA FUNDS

Premier of Manitoba Promises Investigation of Spending of Housing Scheme Money.

Winnipeg, March 28.—Investigation by a county court judge into the administration of the funds allocated under the housing scheme to the municipality of Assiniboia was promised by Premier Norris at the sitting of the legislature of Manitoba on Saturday afternoon, following a statement made by Dr. George Clinegan. The member for Virden earlier in the session had suggested government supervision of the manner in which the money was being used in municipalities, making a special reference to Assiniboia. The member for that constituency, Mr. J. W. Wilson, then thought that Dr. Clinegan should be more explicit, and on Saturday he laid on the table of the house certain documents showing that the City Land Company, of which J. L. Richardson, reeve of Assiniboia, was secretary, had profited out of the scheme.

## BELIEVE STEAMER FIRES OF INCENDIARY ORIGIN

Southampton, March 27.—Two fires on the American liner Philadelphia damaged the vessel so badly today that her sailing was abandoned pending extensive repairs.

In view of similar fires on the steamer New York here recently, the manager of the line believes the fire of incendiary origin. He has offered a reward of \$250 for the apprehension of the guilty persons.

The Philadelphia is an American Line passenger ship of 10,788 tons gross, and was originally the City of Paris of the Inman Line. She was purchased by her present owners in 1898, under authority of a special act of congress. She served during the war as a troop transport, having recently been returned to the passenger service. She was to have sailed for New York next week.

**URUGUAY MAY FORBID**

ALL EXPORT OF WHEAT

Montevideo, Uruguay, March 27.—Exportation of wheat may be forbidden by government decree unless a law is passed to permit its free importation. These alternative measures are suggested by the government to cope with the high cost of living. Both are opposed by the farmers.

**Havana Sales Agency Will**

Try to Sell Cigars to Russia

Havana, March 27.—Twelve big cigar manufacturing firms have formed a co-operative sales agency. The object is to eliminate intermediaries and bring Havana in direct touch with markets on the other side of the Atlantic. An effort will be made to sell cigars to Russia.

## TOWS STEAMER NESCO INTO HALIFAX HARBOR

Western Comet Brings Disabled Sister Ship Over Thousand Miles.

Halifax, March 28.—Eleven days and six hours after she had commenced towing the United States shipping board steamer Western Comet steamed into Halifax harbor yesterday afternoon with the disabled ship, Nesco, of the same fleet, safely secured by two lines. The tow had covered a total distance of 1,010 miles since the morning of March 17.

The Nesco was bound from New Orleans via Norfolk for Antwerp, when she became disabled about 1,000 miles east of Halifax, and was picked up by the Western Comet, en route from Havre to Philadelphia. The two ships headed for Halifax at seven o'clock on the morning of March 17, and encountered some heavy weather enroute, the two tow lines parting on one occasion.

During the first few days the tow averaged 105 miles a day.

Brantford, March 28.—(Special.)—Space was at a premium on the market Saturday morning, more food being offered for sale than has been brought out for many weeks. The outstanding commodity was maple syrup. On the Colborne street side almost every farmer had syrup at a dollar a quart. Eggs were reduced to 50 cents today, giving an opportunity of all who wish to have eggs for Easter. Butter was still up to 70 cents. More chickens than for some weeks were offered from \$1.50 to \$2.50.
