EIGHT STRAIGHT VICTORIES FOR HUGHY DUFFY'S LEAFS

Make a Clean-Up of Syracuse Stars by Taking Both Ends of Wednesday's Double-Header—Currie Turns in Nice Performance.

The Leafs made it a clean-up by taking both games of a double-header from the Syracuse Stars yesterday. It was four straight from the New York State town team and the eighth win on the home ground. The goody crowd of the mid-week holiday fans were present and two new pitchers were trotted out for their inspection. Currie, a semi-pro, picked up in Jersey City, bowled over the Stars without a hit for seven innings and went the full route with only one connection being registered off his delivery. A dried-up pitcher broke on a finger of his pitching hand in the ninth and younger last control. He hit two batters and walked two, Syracuse getting their only two runs of the game here. The Leafs scored seven times.
