TELEPHONE SERVICE WRECKED BY STORM

Towns and Villages in Northern Part of County Cut Off From Toronto.

So far as the York county telephone service is concerned, Sunday night's storm was one of the worst in recent years.

Five hundred patrons of the restaurant were thrown into a panic by the raid and many rushed to waiting taxis and hurried away without their hats or coats.

The raid was made over the head of Police Inspector Domnick Henry, who is in charge of the "vice squad."

Inspector Thomas McDonald, in charge of the "vice squad," and the four detectives who made the arrests, reported they entered the restaurant and ordered whiskey, with which they were served at \$1.50 a drink.

While the inspector and the detectives were drinking, a cordon of police was thrown about the building, and a patrol wagon backed up to the entrance.

Through the police cordon, the patrons, the majority of whom were in formal dress, were allowed to escape into the crowd that had gathered in the street.
