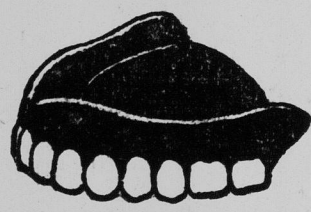

### LATE LOCALS

Repairs have been made on the government steamer W. S. Fielding and she is now at Solloos Rock.

Chas. E. Lockhart, mill owner of Notre Dame, Kent Co., N. B., is the new owner of the trotting mare Ada Mac.

Norwegian steamer Dageid, Captain Olsen, has been fixed to load deals at Pugwash, N. S., for west coast of England, at 22s. 6d.

Government steamer Lady Laurier, which arrived at this port yesterday from Yarmouth, N. S., is engaged today in placing the cables for the submarine bells off Negro Head.

The dominion steamer Lansdowne, Captain George Bisset, accompanied the lightship Lurcher to her moorings last Saturday from Yarmouth, N. S. The trip was successfully accomplished.

At 8 o'clock last night an alarm from box 14 gave the firemen a run to M. J. Nugent's house at the corner of Bristol and Richmond streets. The trouble was a chimney fire which was soon subdued.

About 12.30 o'clock this morning fire was discovered in the corner shop of Chas. Wheaton, on Main street, opposite No. 5 engine house. An alarm was sent in from box 125 and the department were at the scene in a short time. It was found that the proprietor had left a fire on in a range in a small room in the rear and the heat was so intense that some kindling on the floor took fire. The salvage corps men broke open the back door of the shop and a stream from the chemical engine soon put the fire out, practically the only damage done was from the smoke.

### AN ATTRACTIVE BOOKLET

**St. John's Advantages As A Manufacturing Centre Set Forth In Neat Publication.**

The industries committee of the board of trade have just issued a very attractive booklet, showing views of the city and harbor and containing engravings of leading local industries together with much useful information. Facts and figures are given to show that St. John is not only the great winterport of Canada, but an ideal location for manufacturing.

The greater part of the booklet is taken up with a description of the industries already here. Among these are the pulp industry, the lumber trade, line quarries, the iron industry, wood working, brass works, brush making, paper box making, vinegar factories, cigar factories, tea blending houses and many others. The section "Facts About St. John," contains much information which may well be a revelation even to local people who are not as well acquainted with their home as they ought to be. The booklet is a very handsome one and well and artistically gotten up. Copies will be sent where they may influence the securing of manufacturers for St. John.

### THE FISH TRADE WITH THE WEST

**St. John Dealers Shipping As Far As the Pacific Coast—The Local Market.**

Brisk demand, with fairly good supply and prices holding firm, are the leading features of commercial fishery circles in St. John for the present week.

It is equally true, according to a prominent local dealer, that business in some lines, at least, is not so good as it was at this time last year, a fact which, in a measure, is accounted for by the slump in the lumber business.

On Sunday last the schooner Defender arrived with 20,000 pounds of fresh haddock for H. P. Robertson, and during this week the schooner Cora May landed 22,800 pounds of haddock and 1,200 pounds of cod and hake for the same dealer. Like other dealers, Mr. Robertson reports that the fish curing business is good, but the only trouble is to procure a sufficient quantity of fresh stock to work with.

Within the past fortnight Mr. Robertson shipped 800 thirty-pound boxes of haddock to Winnipeg, and has orders for several carloads of fish for Winnipeg, Calgary and the Pacific coast. Leonard Bros. received 30,000 pounds of fresh haddock from Westport, N. S., and 20,000 from various places along the Bay of Fundy coast. A thousand pounds of fresh cod arrived from Grand Manan for James Patterson.

The retail stores are pretty well supplied for tomorrow's trade and the general variety is well up to the standard, considering the time of year. Retail prices rule as follows:—Cod 6c. per lb., haddock 6c., cod steak 10c., pickered 10c., halibut 18c., smelt 10c., mackerel 18c., oysters 75c., scallops 10c. per quart, clams 15c., sea urchins 6c. per lb., boneless cod 12c., fresh chickens 18c. per box, kippers 24c., and blisters 24c. per dozen, finnan haddies 8c. per lb.

### BAIRD & PETERS BUY BIG BUSINESS

**Wholesale Business of James A. Rundle at Newcastle Purchased.**

NEWCASTLE, Nov. 20.—The announcement was made here today that Baird & Peters had purchased the wholesale business of James A. Rundle of this place. It is the intention of Baird & Peters to carry on the business on a larger scale than formerly. They will handle a full line of groceries as well as flour and feed. W. E. O. Jones of St. John will be in charge of the new branch for the present, but later a permanent manager will be appointed. The branch will supply the whole Miramichi district.

F. E. Dixon will have a general supervision over both branches at Newcastle and Campbellton.

### LUMBERING PROSPECTS What Is Being Done in Welsford and Vicinity.

WELSFORD, Nov. 20.—Messrs. Reid & Rennie are running two camps across the stream from Eagle Rock. They are feeding Hemlock logs, and piling for the New York market.

James W. Cochrane is cutting logs and pulp wood on Mrs. J. E. Woods' land for L. Langley, of Westfield.

Campbell Street has had a heavy job lately moving Ed. Hughes' mill from Caribou Lake to Queens Lake, to saw a large cut in Queens Lake.

Harry Baird, of St. Mary's, York Co., has a large crew cutting for H. W. Woods on the old Merritt lot, near Government House, so called.

Messrs. McKenzie & Nise are to have another cut where their mill was last summer at "Fowler's Falls." Then they are to move to the Harding Brook farm in the spring, to cut for them and some others that are going to have lumber in the same place.

A large quantity of dry spruce is being cut near Blagdon to be shipped to the American market for pulp wood, by the Rowley Brothers, Westfield.

At Clarendon Messrs. Thos. Howell, Abner Howe and others are also cutting pulp wood for export.

Michael & McCrackin, who have a gasoline engine running a threshing machine, have had a serious time lately with the engine balking on them.

### WINTER PORT NOTES

**Four Steamers Due Here During Next Few Days.**

The C. P. R. Royal Mail steamship, Empress of Ireland, in command of Capt. Forster, will be due to arrive here tomorrow morning from Liverpool via Halifax. She has 637 passengers on board, consisting of 63 saloon, 127 second cabin and 463 steerage.

The big liner is due at Halifax today and will land the mails and any passengers for that city, after which she will sail at once for the winter port of Canada.

Allan line steamship Tunisian, Capt. Bruce, is also due at Halifax today, and due here tomorrow or Saturday morning. She has on board 933 passengers, 144 cabin and 789 steerage.

Donaldson line steamer Tritonia, coming direct to this port from Glasgow is due now and tomorrow.

C. P. R. steamship Monmouth is also due direct from Cardiff.

Furness line steamship Kanawha, left London on the 12th for this port.

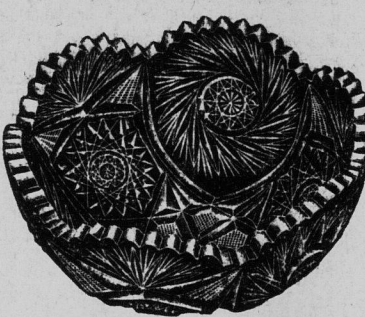
