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tion with the grand educational system of Ontario, and his ceaseless efforts in behalf of our Victoria University; or who had come within the range of a character than which none could be more simple, transparent, and truly noble. At an advanced age, full of years and honors, he died as only a Christian can die.

Permit us to assure you that we have learned with joy of your success, and have not been unconcerned observers of your losses. We "commend you to God and to the word of His grace," and trust that in the growth of all departments of work your future history as a Church may be not only as in the past, but "much more abundant."
