**HER FATHER
LCST AT SEA**

Young Girl Orphaned on Voyage From England to United States

New York, July 16.—Officers of a passenger liner which has arrived in this country from a British port report that one of the first cabin passengers, Charles A. Williams, an American mining engineer from Johannesburg, South Africa, disappeared from the ship during the trip and left his 15-year-old daughter Helen alone on board. Passengers who had talked with Mr. Williams on the voyage said that the daughter had been born in South Africa and sent to England to be educated by her father after Mrs. Williams died. He told the women passengers that he was bringing his daughter to America to see some of her relations and get away from the war atmosphere in Europe.

On the only rough day of the voyage the ship rolled and pitched heavily. Mr. Williams occupied his seat at table at dinner that night and seemed to be in the best of spirits. He said he would walk the deck while a concert was being held in the dining saloon. While the chairman was making his speech, about 8.30, for a collection in aid of the Seamen's Widows' and Orphans' Fund, the liner gave a terrific lurch to starboard, which threw him from his feet and even took the cloth and papers off the table in front of him. Miss Williams attended the concert with Miss N. L. Cowley, one of Lord Northcliffe's secretaries, who was a passenger with Miss Williams and Miss Gillow, two other members of his staff, and did not miss her father until after 10 o'clock, when she wanted to bid him good-night. After a steward had searched the deck, smoking room, and saloons without finding Mr. Williams, he reported this to the purser, who notified the commander.

A thorough search was then made of all parts of the liner without finding any trace of the missing passenger or any one who had seen him on deck

after dinner. It was possible that he might have been on the top deck and gone over the side accidentally at the time the liner gave the big lurch. He was wealthy and had no complaint of any trouble to any one on board.

The daughter, left all alone, was stunned when she was told the next morning that her father could not be found. When questioned by immigration inspectors, Miss Williams said that she had an uncle somewhere in America, who had sent her birthday presents when she was a little girl in South Africa, but she did not know his name.

Miss Cowley took charge of the young girl, and she is now in a boarding house frequented by English travelers in Madison Avenue, near Thirty-fifth street, to remain until her relatives have been heard from. The agents of the steamship line have sent to New Haven, Conn., her father's native city, to see if the uncle lives there, and have also called to England, where he had friends.

LORD ROBERTS AND GLASSES FOR THE ARMY

London, Eng., June, 1917.

To the Editor of The Times:

Sir,—As I have received frequent enquiries from Canada respecting our collection of field-glasses, I venture to ask you for space to give the information desired.

At the beginning of the war, my father, Lord Roberts, asked the public to lend their field-glasses and telescopes to the army. The answer from all over the empire was most gratifying to him, and I think it may be claimed that the glasses have been of the greatest service to our armies on every front. Since his death the work has been carried by me on the lines laid down by him, and we have been able to allocate in all, nearly 30,000 instruments. I should explain that every glass is engraved with a registered number corresponding to an entry in our archives here, in order to facilitate its return, should circumstances permit, at the end of the war. Before being issued the glasses are classified by experts, and allocated according to their special character, to different ranks and units. It has been a pleasure to me to issue lately more than 100 glasses, in addition, to Canadian officers on their way to France. Owing to the recent developments on the western front, the need for glasses is now very insistent, and I should be most grateful for any more that can be spared. I will of course gladly acknowledge any such offers.

PRESERVES WITHOUT SUGAR

Can. Gov't St'c. Dillard, July 18, 1917.

To the Editor of the Times-Star:

Sir,—I hope you will pardon me, if I ask you to publish an account of an experiment I have tried and found successful. Two years ago I thought it might be possible to keep berries without sugar by cooking them in airtight jars, which would be the same as canning them.

I tried sixteen bottles of blueberries the first year. When I opened them in the winter they proved superior to the canned berries, being brighter in color, and without the taste of the tin.

noticeable with canned berries. Last year I had sixty bottles and there was not a bad one in the lot.

The method is simple, so that any one can do it with very little trouble; put the berries in the jars with about half enough water to fill the jar with the berries in it, screw down the top airtight (screw top jars are the best), put the jars in a boiler in cold water, and let it come to a boil, when the water has reached the boiling point, take them off and allow them to cool with the air; when cold, set them away in a cool place until wanted for use.

I hope these suggestions may prove beneficial to some housekeeper, who dreads the preserving season on account of the high price of sugar.
