Newsy Briefs on Current Pastimes of Interest to Fans.

Previous reports that speed skaters had been selected to represent the United States in the Olympics have proven erroneous. An official announcement that four representatives will be selected at trials to be held on December 29 in New York and New England has been made by Joseph Savage, president of the International Skating Union. To date the six candidates are Charles Jewtraw, Joe Moore, William Steinmetz, Harry Kasky, Richard Donovan and Victor Blais. As all of these skaters are well known here having participated in championship meets held on Lily Lake the result of the trials will be awaited with interest.

Roland Todd, English middleweight champion, will make his debut in America when he meets Tommy Gribb at the Madison Square Garden next Monday night. Todd will have a pretty stiff proposition on his hands as Gribb has been credited with a decision over Greb. The unfortunate part as far as Gribb is concerned is that he cannot make 160 pounds. He is a clever boxer and an ambitious one, but unless he can take off some weight he will never be able to annex the middleweight championship.

According to reports from New York "Battling" Siki is "hitting the high spots." This is not new for the Senegalese, but sooner or later it will mean his finish. The boxing fans in the States may find Siki a novelty at the present time, but if he continues they will quickly tire of him. It may be amusing to watch him perform a jig on a street corner, but it is another thing to pay good money to see him make a poor showing in the ring. At a recent bout held in New York Siki was introduced to the audience. He stepped into the ring he was greeted, not with applause, but with roars of derision. There was a reason for this. He wore an opera cape, white gloves, immense brown brocade, a wing collar and a nobly walking stick. It seems as if the boxing fans in New York have found a new play toy.

The United States seems to be a land of golden opportunity for European boxers. When their bank accounts get low they set sail for America and usually have little difficulty securing bouts. It is evident that Georges Carpentier is out for some more good American money for from all accounts he is ready to visit the States as soon as he can. He has notified him that the time is ripe for an early killing. It is doubtful if Carpentier would draw a capful of light heavyweight. Mike McTigue is by no means a sensational boxer, while Greb has made anything but a sensation since he won his middleweight crown from Johnny Wilson. "Battling" Siki is still running wild, so it is evident that Rickard will have difficulty helping Georges fatten his bank account.

It is quite evident that Eddie Collins is holding out grouch against Frank Chance because of his appointment as manager of the White Sox. In a recent interview he gave out the following reasons: "I at no time ever applied to Charles Comiskey to become manager of the White Sox, and as Comiskey never offered me the post, how can I be disappointed?" "Get me right. I want to play baseball and not manage. I think I have some big things to play left in me. This year was one of the best seasons I ever had. I batted around the 360 mark and stole a bunch of bases and also made a couple of stops and throws."

"I think that Comiskey made a very shrewd move when he signed Chance. I know Chance only from the standpoint of an opposing player, but he is a great manager and fair to his men. Nobody can ask any more."

"Chance is the ideal Chicago fan still and Comiskey made a 10 strike in appointing him. It will give the White Sox a lot of pep and new prestige and help things immensely."

"I intend to go South with the White Sox next spring with the idea of showing Chance that I still know a little about playing baseball."

PREPARING FOR HOCKEY LEAGUE

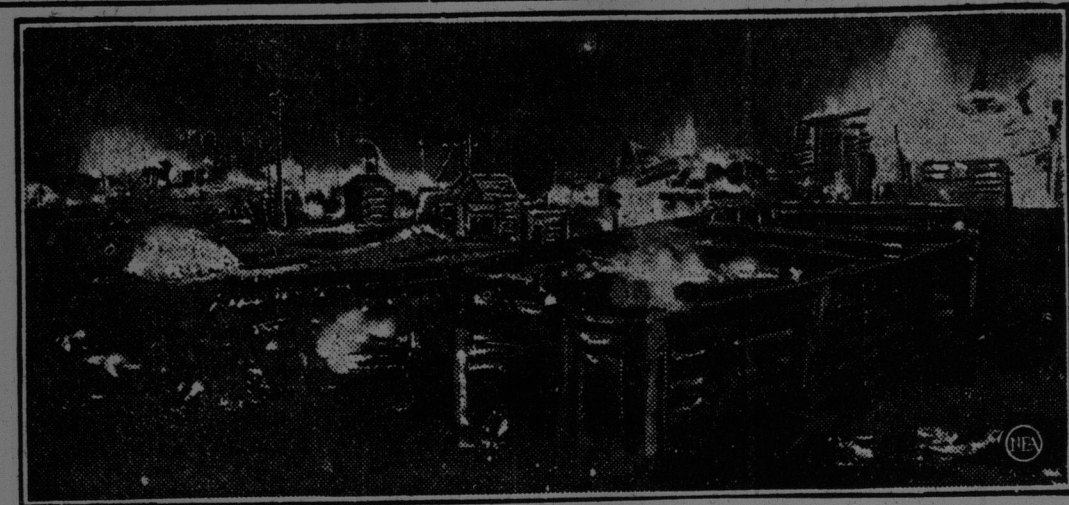

BIKE STAR WILL NEVER RACE AGAIN

Jake Magin Forced to Get Out of the Six-Day Grind.

New York, Dec. 7.—Jake Magin of Irvington, N. J., professional bicycle racing star for more than 15 years has pedaled his last six-day race. The veteran was forced out of the 36th International six-day grind at Madison Square Garden this week as a result of heart trouble and physicians asserted he never again would be able to withstand the grueling pace of another campaign.

Magin made his first appearance in a six-day race in 1910. He has been victorious five times, twice with Alfred Gouillet and once with Reggie McNamara at Madison Square Garden and twice at Chicago with Eddie Madden as his partner.

In the six-day race last March Magin sustained injuries that kept him out of competition for months when he rode over the high bank of the Garden saucer.

Magin was born in Philadelphia. He is 36 years old.

HOLY CROSS MAY BUILD \$300,000 FOOTBALL FIELD

Portland, Me., Dec. 6.—(Special).—Johnny McIntyre, of St. John, won from Johnny Poduk, of Fall River, in a slashing semi-final battle at the Eastern A. C. show here tonight. McIntyre staggered his opponent in the opening round and had the better in the next three rounds, but Poduk came back in the last two sessions.

SIKI'S ANTICS ATTRACT THROG

Senegalese Thrills Broadway—Had Been Imbibing Freely.

New York, Dec. 6.—Battling Siki, the singular Senegalese, who achieved pugilistic fame by knocking out Georges Carpentier, provided Broadway with a thrill a few days ago with the aid of a quantity of synthetic gin, a wrinkled dress suit and a pair of expensive patent leather shoes.

He obviously had made a night of it, and part of the day, when he appeared at Broadway, at Forty-fourth street. He craved attention. So he emitted one of his native war cries. He got attention. The crowd that blocked traffic formed a ring and the singular one executed as nifty a war dance as ever was trod upon the hot sands of his native Senegal.

He moved up a block, to Forty-fifth street, taking his audience and his enthusiasm with him. He repeated his performance at Forty-eighth, when he was told that the police were on his trail. He disappeared into a taxicab, bound for the black belt in Harlem.

It was Siki's first escape from his manager in a week. His last adventure occurred when he fled his training camp with \$1,000, which rolled away in a flood of alcohol.

His manager was still looking for him tonight.
