Fredericton, Jan. 22.—The department of agriculture is arranging for a delegation to leave for Ottawa on Wednesday night to present the case of the potato shippers of New Brunswick to the Minister of Finance, Hon. W. S. Fielding, in the matter of discrimination against Canadian potatoes under the new amended Cuban tariff. Harvey Mitchell, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, will get in touch with Guy S. Porter of Andover and arrange for the personnel of the delegation. Hon. D. W. Mersereau, Minister of Agriculture, will be unable to accompany the delegation because of a prior engagement in St. John on Thursday.

The expectation is that the delegation will be chiefly representatives of Carleton and Victoria counties. T. W. Caldwell, M. P., of Florenceville, representing those counties at Ottawa, has interested himself in the matter. It is not known yet whether York County will be represented.
