**THE "BLUE BOY"**  
WILL BE EXHIBITED  
Famous Gainsborough to be Shown in New York to Aid Hospital Fund.

(New York Times.)

Gainsborough's famous "Blue Boy," considered by many critics to be the greatest portrait ever painted, which was painted in New York City, arrived on the La Savoye yesterday. The painting will be placed in storage until the fifteenth or sixteenth of this month, when it will be exhibited for three weeks at the Duveen Galleries, 720 Fifth Avenue. The exhibition will be a big art and social event. Admission will be charged, and the receipts will be sent to the Fifth Avenue Hospital.

The big picture, since its purchase, has been cleaned of innumerable coats of varnish which had clouded the rich blue that made the portrait the sensation of the art world. Exhibited at the National Galleries in England before having that country, it was admired by unprecedented crowds, that viewed it almost with reverence, the men with their hats raised as they passed.

Many pretensions were taken in bringing the picture to this country. It was accompanied by two men from the Duveen Galleries in London—William Todd and Charles Hunt. The picture traveled in a roadster which was carefully watched throughout the trip. It was previously being heavily insured, and was insured for \$200,000. The picture was shipped in a steel box and that again in an iron box. The picture was shipped from Havre Jan. 28.

The "Blue Boy" ranks as one of the highest priced pictures ever put on the market. The Duveens having been reported to have paid \$210,000, about \$700,000 would be the present rate of exchange for the painting. "The Cottage Door," also by Gainsborough, accompanied and shared honors with the "Blue Boy" in its carefully watched seclusion on the voyage.

**BONAR LAW'S WARNING**  
Forewarn Premier's Difficulties in Irish Situation.

(Special Cable to The New York Times and Montreal Gazette.)

London, Feb. 9.—Today's developments in the Irish situation have brought back forcibly to the public mind the words of Bonar Law used at the last session in the House of Commons when he made the peace treaty completely safe by coming out in its support. "This is not the time for throwing caps in the air," he said. "Six months hence I do not think this treaty will be a political asset to the prime minister, but I hope that in the distant future by the verdict of posterity it will be found to be a triumph for him. It is absurd to think that Ireland is in a state of demoralization, and chaos as bad as has ever occurred in the history of any country. There are going to be terrible difficulties, but I see this prospect for us at any rate. Up to now there has never been any public opinion in the south of Ireland except against this country. Whatever else happens we are more or less out of the picture. If they must fight they will fight each other."

Here arises the question, what attitude will Bonar Law take? In his speech already cited he said, "If ever the Ulster people had a right to consider that a question was settled and settled for ever, it was the question of boundaries. In a letter written to me by the prime minister just before the last election he specified that anything dealing with Ireland which interfered not with Ulster, but with the six counties was impossible." This was taken to mean that Bonar Law at the last session regarded the substantial integrity of Ulster as set up by the Act of 1920 as part of a fundamental pact on which the coalition was founded, and though he advised Sir James Craig to accept, under the treaty a reasonable rectification of boundaries, it is contended that he could not possibly accept with content.

## PROPOSED UNION OF CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND

**Matter Receiving Attention in St. John's Papers.**

Many Arguments in Favor of Project—Would Stabilize Island's Fish Markets, is Opinion—Relief for Railway Situation and Steamer Connections.

(Canadian Press)

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 9.—The question of a union of Newfoundland and Canada has been receiving some attention in the ancient colony, according to newspaper of St. John's received here.

One writer affirms that it is reasonable to suppose that the Canadian government would be relieved of the expense of the Atlantic to the Pacific would, to assure the entry of Newfoundland into the confederation, take over the Reid railway of Newfoundland and convert it into a broad gauge line. Thus, by one stroke, the writer suggests, Newfoundland would be relieved of the payment of the subsidy of \$1,200,000 recently granted the Reid railway, and secure a better service compared with that which the present service is not worth mentioning.

Another writer recognizes that Canada is destined to become an important nation, but only by Newfoundland becoming part thereof, because "the island's geographical position is the key to Canada's future." Canadian statesmen think, and will therefore be prepared to offer terms of union which it would be wise for Newfoundland to ascertain carefully.

One argument advanced for union with Canada is that the Canadian government would then be interested in helping Newfoundland solve her problem of shipping fish to the Mediterranean and other markets, while the Canadian government would load the bulk of her summer catch of fish on small sailing vessels, and rushes them to southern Europe. Every merchant wants to have his consignments across the Atlantic before the arrival of midwinter and its violent storms. The consequence is that the markets are temporarily overstocked and prices drop. If the Canadian government provided St. John's with a direct connection, by regular steamship service, with the Mediterranean, the movement of dried fish could be regulated to the market requirements and prices thereby stabilized. It is argued. Shipments of the island's staple product by small sailing vessels, many of which are lost every winter, is not a satisfactory situation. Though the ancient colony had a large number of idle vessels, and thus sell more fish in these southern markets. On the other hand there are fish merchants who fear that if Newfoundland enter the Confederation, the large Canadian fish firms operating in Nova Scotia and Quebec, would invade the ancient colony and gradually obtain control of the strategic positions in the fish business.

Hon. W. F. Cook, minister of marine and fisheries and also president of the Newfoundland Fishermen's Protective Union, has recently expressed strong opposition to the idea of union with Canada. His view is that Canada is necessarily a competitor of Newfoundland products to any extent, and has no surplus capital to develop her own resources, much less to help develop those of the island.

According to Mr. Cooker, Newfoundland should take warning from Nova Scotia, which, he alleges, made a sad mistake when it entered the Canadian Confederation, because, "It has been indefinitely stagnant ever since," he says.
