INCREASE IN DIVORCES IN THE DOMINION

Ottawa, May 31—(Canadian Press.)—In view of a stubborn battle being fought in the House of Commons against a divorce to Alphonse Lemoyne of Martigny of Montreal, it is interesting to note that since Confederation the divorce committee of the senate has granted 61 divorces, 384 of which were on application of the husbands and 256 on the application of wives.

During that period, Ontario has led with 406, as against 371 in Quebec, twenty-seven from Manitoba, thirteen from Saskatchewan, twenty-one from Alberta, two from British Columbia, one from Prince Edward Island, and seven from the Northwest Territories.

In the ten-year period from 1917 to 1926, 187 out of 197 divorces were granted. In the ten years ended in 1920 only nine divorces were approved, while if all the applications there is every reason to suppose they will, the total for 1921 will reach 110.

DYKE BREAKS; LAND FLOODED

Couriers Warn Farmers to Flee as the Columbia River Washes Lands.

Woodland, Washington, May 31—A dyke protecting a reclaimed farm area of some 18,000 acres near broke under pressure of flood waters early this morning. The pumping station at Birch Bluff was washed out and indications were that the entire district would be flooded. Between 400 and 500 farmers live in the district.

Couriers were sent to warn them to flee. The dyke broken was completed this year at a cost of about \$200,000. The flood from the Columbia River began to cut into it last week.

The dyked land will be flooded to a depth of from eight to twelve feet, according to present indica- tions.
