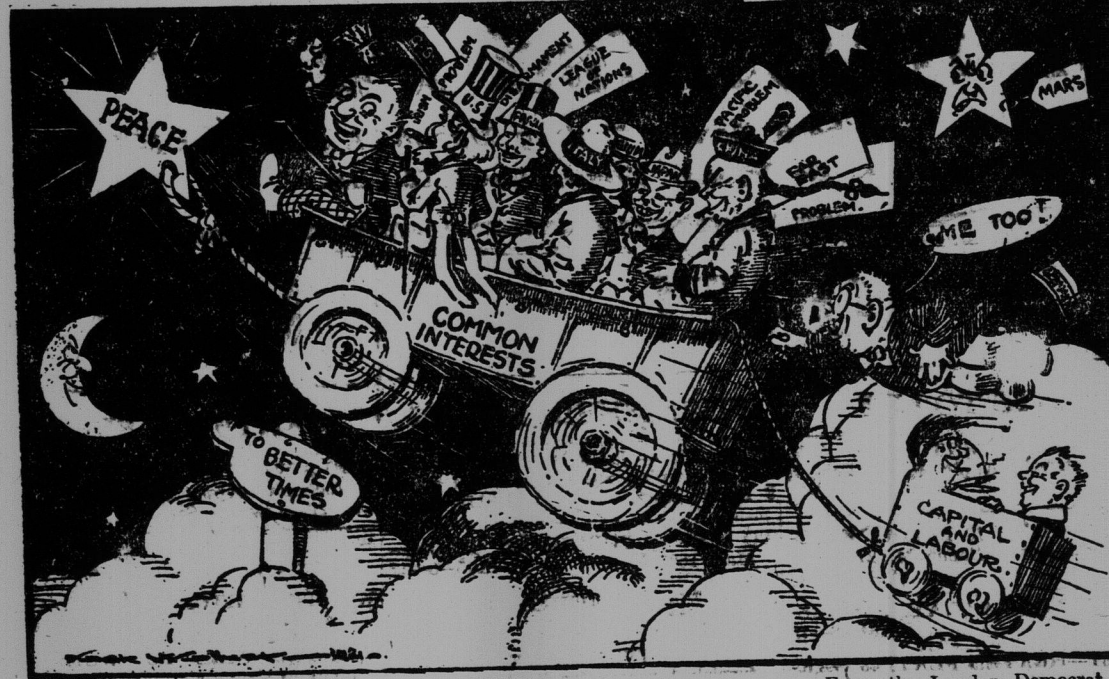

45 STATES AID EX-SERVICE MEN

Cash Bonuses Total \$184,000,000 and Assistance of Other Kinds is Provided.

Forty-five states out of forty-eight in the United States have passed legislation authorizing aid to veterans in some form of benefits of exemptions of some kind, according to a survey just completed by the Bank of America of New York.

The three states which have taken no action are Alabama, Georgia, and Mississippi.

In fourteen states veterans are receiving or have received cash bonuses amounting to \$184,000,000 and legislation providing for an additional disbursement of \$191,000,000 is pending in eight other states. The largest amount to be paid by one state is in Illinois where \$55,000,000 will be given out if the law authorizing it passes a popular referendum.

The form of bonus the survey reported varies from payments of from \$10 to \$25 for each month of service to fixed amounts such as the outright gift of \$100 in three New England States.

Besides the cash payments, aid of a practical nature has been offered in several states. Fifteen offer vocational training to veterans, and California goes one step further and offers such training to the dependents of veterans. In nine states veterans are exempted from some form of taxation, and in sixteen they are given preference in the civil service.

BERLIN TO TRY OUT TRACKLESS TROLLEYS.
Berlin, Aug. 12.—Berlin hopes to find a solution for financing its street railway by introducing trackless trolley cars and by using cars operated entirely by one man, in the suburbs. The trackless trolley cars not only will obviate the expense of 1,500,000 marks per kilometer for tracks, but will be even cheaper to operate than automobile buses, as the street cars cost only three marks per kilometer to run, as against five and a half marks for buses.

THE APPLE CROP.
The apple crop throughout the Dominion, though seriously effected by recent drought, is still likely to average better than last year. Reports received by the department of agriculture indicate that the apple crop in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Quebec will exceed the yield of last year, while Nova Scotia and Ontario will register slight declines. British Columbia expects a crop some 10 per cent better than last year.

MAN'S WHOLE BODY RIGID.
Bill in Congress to Aid Sufferer Waiting for Death.

Washington, Aug. 12.—The senate has just sent to the house a bill for the benefit of a St. Louis man, who is so rigid from arthritis that he is unable to move any joint of his body except to open his lips a trifle less than a quarter inch.

Despite his terrible handicap, this man, Arthur E. Rump, has for a number of years supported himself in a brave manner. Lying in bed, his body like stone, he conceived the idea of a combined telephone transmitter and receiver, which he had strapped to his chest. Up to a few months ago he could move the last joint of his thumb, and with this he operated the telephone, calling up various people in St. Louis and asking them if they would subscribe for magazines.

About eleven years ago the sufferer was a clerk in the St. Louis post office, and was injured by a heavy bag of mail tossed from a wagon, which struck him on the back of the neck. Arthritis set in as a result.

LAUNCH WAS FIRED ON.

WILL NOW TEST MILK EACH DAY

A meeting of the County Hospital Board was held in the office of the county secretary, J. King Kelly, K.C., yesterday morning. H. B. Schofield was in the chair, and others present were Dr. Harris, Dr. S. H. McDonald and W. J. Dean.

The county secretary was instructed to notify all orphanages that children living outside the county of St. John and having no legal settlement in New Brunswick would not be received at the institution unless paid for, and in cases where the child had a legal settlement the county in which its parents belonged would be charged.

Instructions also were given to the doctor in charge of the hospital to install a milk-testing machine for the purpose of testing the amount of butterfat and dirt in the milk. Daily tests will be made in the future and the supply checked up.

KILLED BY GERMAN.

Mexican Lawyer Shot—Assaults Fled to Mountains.

Mexico City, August 12.—Perez Vardía, a prominent Mexican lawyer, was shot and killed, and his companions fled to the mountains.

Vardía had been ordered by the court to place an embargo on a ranch near Mexico City in the possession of the Germans.

The arrival of Vardía and his companions at the ranch was the signal for the Germans, who were armed with rifles, to open fire, killing Vardía at the first shot and wounding his two brothers, who accompanied him to the ranch.

The Germans after killing, escaped to the mountains.

PROPOSED RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE JITNEYS

Schedule Drawn Up for Consideration of the City Solicitor.

At a special committee meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon the matter of jitney regulations was discussed and Mr. Thorneycroft presented a schedule governing their use and operation. After defining the words "motor bus" and "person" the following rules were proposed:

- 1.—No person shall run or operate, or cause to be run or operated, a motor bus within the city of St. John without first obtaining a license therefor from the mayor; and no license shall be issued until and unless the person desiring to operate such a motor bus shall file with the mayor an application in writing, which application shall state:
 - (a) The make of the motor bus.
 - (b) The year the vehicle was made.
 - (c) The seating capacity of the motor bus according to its trade rating.
 - (d) If the motor bus has been rebuilt or adapted, the seating capacity as rebuilt or adapted.
 - (e) The number of miles run.
 - (f) The rated horsepower.
 - (g) The factory number.
 - (h) The city license number.
 - (i) The points between which the motor bus is to be operated.
 - (j) The route, or routes, which the motor bus is to operate, both going and returning.
 - (k) The fare to be charged between designated points, both going and returning.
 - (l) The number of the license as issued by the mayor shall be legibly painted on or displayed in plain view upon the side of the motor bus.
 - (m) The time of departure from designated points and the fare to be charged in the application except that the child under seven years of age may be carried in the laps of persons accompanying them.
 - (n) No passenger shall be allowed to sit or stand upon the steps, running board, hood or door of any motor bus.
 - (o) Each operator or driver shall be required to carry in the motor bus of which he is in charge, a full set of standard life chains, which shall be kept in good condition ready to be placed on the wheels of the vehicle when the condition of the roads or streets suggest their use.
 - (p) No more than one passenger shall be allowed to occupy the seat with the driver thereof.
 - (q) Failure to maintain the operating schedule for a period of three days shall be considered as a cause for revoking the license.
 - (r) Every person having a license to operate a motor bus shall cause the said vehicle to be kept in a safe and proper condition for use in the business of carrying passengers and to that end shall cause the brakes and steering gear of the same to be carefully examined by a competent person familiar with the construction and operating mechanism of such motor vehicle before the same be put in service and at least once a month thereafter.
 - (s) No operator of a motor bus shall create any disturbance or unnecessary noise to attract persons to the vehicle as passengers.
 - (t) No motor bus shall stop for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers at a point within fifty feet of a white pole or at an otherwise designated stopping place or waiting room of any electric railroad.
 - (u) The operator of a motor bus while carrying passengers shall cause the vehicle to come to a full stop before crossing the tracks of any steam or electric railroad.
 - (v) The violation of any of the foregoing rules will be sufficient cause for the mayor, in his discretion, to revoke the license.

Furthermore, the owner of the bus shall carry a policy protecting the bus against any damage to property, to the amount of \$10,000.

The insurance policy covering the foregoing shall be filed with the city clerk concurrent with the license being issued and returnable to the owner of the bus after his license has expired or has been cancelled.

HARTY A TOTAL LOSS.
