Pinehurst, N. C., April 15.—(Special)—F. C. Watson, Jr., of Baltimore, won the qualifying medal in the mid April tournament here today, leading the field of eighty-five contestants with a round of 81-39-80.

Ned Beall, the North and South champion was second in 82. Three Riverside Club golfers, of St. John (N. B.), Percy W. Thomson, L. de V. Chipman and Eric D. Thomson qualified in the fourth sixteen.

AQUATIC

Y. M. C. A. Sports.

The swimming pool of the Y. M. C. A., newly equipped with an up-to-date filtration plant, was reopened last night with a splendid series of events of aquatic sports. The sports were witnessed and much applauded by a large gathering and the competitors acquitted themselves with marked credit to themselves and to J. H. Maughan, their instructor. The programme included fancy diving, porpoise swimming, pigging for distance and many fancy stunts, that of drinking water from a bottle under water being done very cleverly. The diving through a burning hoop was also well and neatly executed. Mr. Maughan's own exhibition of stunts was greeted with special enthusiasm, and was the wonder of his pupils.

The new filter is one of the New York Continental Jewel filters operated by a Darling Bros. pump which was installed by A. R. Williams Machinery Co. The plant cost \$2,000 completed, the work being in charge of David Peter, under whose direction a perfectly acting system of filtration has been obtained and the purity of the water added greatly to the effectiveness of the aquatic events last night as it was possible to see as clearly through the water as through glass. The motor pumps the water from the deep end of the tank through the filter composed of sand, quartz, gravel and rocks, and passing from the filter is chemically treated and returned to the shallow end of the pool, being entirely filtered each twenty-four hours, and always in motion.

Judges of the sports were S. L. Kerr, W. Anderson, George E. Barbour, starter, F. T. Barbour, time keeper, George Warwick, and scorer, C. Dickson. The awarding of the prizes will take place on May 3, when the annual boys' banquet will be held.
