RUSSIAN PRISONERS

ENSLAVED BY GERMANS

Bruges, Oct. 22—A fresh and striking
instance of the inhumanity of the Ger-
man authorities has been discovered by
Belgian soldiers in liberated territory.
They found a large number of Russian
soldiers, who were captured three years
ago, at work with German labor com-
panies. The Russians had been treated
with the utmost brutality and forced to
labor behind the firing line. They
were utterly ignorant of the Russian
revolution, the death of Emperor Nich-
olas, or the Brest-Litovsk treaty of
peace.

ASKS \$600,000,000 FOR U. S. NAVY

Washington, Oct. 22—Congress has

been asked by the navy department to

authorize a second three year naval

building programme to provide ten ad-
ditional super-dreadnoughts, six battle

cruisers and 140 smaller vessels at a cost

of \$600,000,000. This was disclosed to-
night by Secretary Daniels after his ap-
pearance before the house naval com-
mittee to explain the appropriation.

REDOUBLED EFFORTS

SHOULD BE THE ANSWER

Edmonton, Oct. 22—"I do not take

not slacken its energy for one moment.
That is the best way to obtain peace."
