The Evening Chit-Chat

MUCH of the darkness of our lives is due to our walking in our own shadow.
And our shadow will never trouble us when we walk towards the light.
There is a big pot of fluffy yellow daffodils on my working desk.
Yesterday morning when they were being watered they were accident-
ally turned away from the sun.
In the middle of the forenoon in a penitential moment, I gazed at them and
was brought out of my abstraction by the fact that these yellow blooms were slowly
turning their faces back towards the sun.
By noon they had completely accomplished this tremen-
dous feat—change.
Wise little daffodils.
How much wiser than many, many people.
A neighbor of mine lost her little baby six months ago.
It was a beautiful pink and white and gold baby. It was
cruel, hard to lose it, torture to have it taken from the warm
cuddling place of her arms and put away in the cold indiffer-
ent earth.
My neighbor's grief hung like a pall on her home. Her
manner was the sombre fluttering of a crane on a door. There
were four other beautiful children in that home. They
were enough to make sunshine anywhere. And they needed their
mother's companion-ship. They suffer from the depression of her
determined grief. I wonder how long she will persist in
facing the dark corner of her loss instead of turning towards
the sunshine of her great possessions.
You see she is not as wise as my daffodils.
Every life has its dark corner of loss or deprivation or unfulfilled desires and
ambitions.
Every life has its sunshine of human beings to love and to be loved and needed
by; of work to do, of a religion to be felt, of friendship and pleasures to enjoy.
There are times, of course, when circumstances face us towards that dark
corner for a time.
That is inevitable.
But to grow, facing it, is not. And if we permit ourselves to do so, our lives
will lose their spring and radiance just as surely as my daffodils would have lost
their color and freshness and faded before their time if they had not turned back
towards the sun.
Sometimes it is a great effort to turn away from that dark corner, I know, but
think of the persistent effort my daffodils make.
Wise little daffodils.
Brave little daffodils.
How much wiser they are than many, many people.

**Daily Hints
For the Cook**

FIG DESSERT.
Chop one pound of figs and put in a
stew pan with one pint of water, six
ounces of sugar and a little lemon peel.
Cook in the oven for two hours, then rub
through a sieve (removing the lemon peel)
and add one half ounce of gelatin pre-
viously dissolved in water and strained. As
it begins to cool, stir in one fourth gill
of thick sweet cream. Have ready a bor-
der mold, masked with jelly and decorated
with chopped almonds and pistachios, fill
with the fig puree and set on the ice to
harden. Turn out of the mold on to a
cold dish, and fill the centre with whip-
ped cream.

SPICE FINGERS.
Cream thoroughly three tablespoons
of butter with a scant cupful of brown
sugar, adding a teaspoonful of powdered
cinnamon, a half teaspoonful each of nut-
meg and allspice, a quarter of a teaspoon-
ful each of ginger and salt. Stir one
teaspoonful of stiff baking soda into one
cupful of rich sour cream and as it foams
add it to the spice mixture alternately
with enough Graham and white flour (half
and half) to make a soft dough. Turn on
a floured board and knead into it three
tablespoonsful of seeded raisins, three
of currants and one each of chopped citron
and candied orange peel. Roll out very
thin, cut in strips with a jagged iron, then
sprinkle with powdered sugar and bake
in a moderate oven until brown and crisp.

WILL REPRESENT THEIR NATIONS AT CROWNING OF KING

London, March 29.—The following is a
list of foreign representatives who will
attend the coronation of King George V.:
Germany—The crown prince and prin-
cess. (Also Prince and Princess Henry,
privately.)
France—Vice-Admiral de Fauré de Jon-
quieres (ambassador extraordinary). Gen-
eral Dor de Lestours, Captain Langier and
M. Maurice Herbet.
Austria-Hungary—The Archduke Fran-
cis Ferdinand (his apparent) and the
Archduchess Charles Francis Joseph.
Spain—The Infante, Duke of Calabria,
Turkey—Prince Yusuf Izzet-Din (his
apparent).
Italy—The Duke of Aosta.
Holland—Prince Henry of the Nether-
lands.
Japan—H. I. Prince Higashia Fushimi
and General Nogi and Admiral Togo.
Denmark—The crown prince and princess.
Sweden—The crown prince and princess.
Norway—Mr. Irgens, minister for for-
eign affairs.
China—Tsai-chen (eldest son of Prince
Ching, the regent).
Chile—The Chilean minister in London,
and also a general and an admiral.
The following are some of the repre-
sentatives from the overseas dominions:
Canada—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and others.
Newfoundland—Mr. Bishop (member of
legislative council), and the speaker of the
house of assembly.
Victoria—Hon. John Murray (premier).
New South Wales—Hon. J. McGowan
(premier) and the under-secretary for the
treasury.
Western Australia—Hon. Frank Wilson
(premier).
South Australia—The agent general in
London.
Tasmania—Sir Elliott Lewis (premier).
New Zealand—Sir Joseph Ward (pre-
mier), Mr. Hall and Mr. Mahan.
Hong Kong—Sir Paul Chater (member
of the legislative council) and Henry Ker-
wick.

THE APPOINTMENT OF LORD KITCHENER AS HEAD OF THE TROOPS

It has been officially announced that the
king has been pleased to approve the ap-
pointment of Field Marshal Viscount Kit-
chener of Khartoum, G. C. B., O. M.,
G. C. S. I., G. C. M. I., G. C. I. E. to com-
mand the troops assembled in London on
the occasion of their majesties' coronation.
Major-General A. E. Corderoy, C. V. O.,
C. B., has been appointed chief staff offi-
cer, and will act under Lord Kitchener's
orders as general officer commanding Lon-
don district.
The following general officers have been
appointed to command sections of the
routes of the processions under their lord-
ships' direction:
Gen. Sir Charles Douglas, K. C. B., (gen-
eral officer commanding-in-chief southern
command). Lieut-Gen. Sir Horace Smith
Dorrien, K. C. B., D. S. O., A. D. C. gen-
eral (general officer commanding-in-chief
Allied command). Lieut-Gen. Sir Arth-
ur Paget, K. C. B., K. C. V. O., A. D. C.
general (general officer commanding-in-chief
eastern command).
The career of Lord Kitchener, first in
Egypt, then in South Africa, and finally
in India, is too long well known to need
more than a passing reference. Twice has
he received the thanks of parliament; the
first time was after the Khartoum expedi-
tion which he commanded in 1898, on which
occasion he was also raised to the peerage;
the second time was in 1902 at the close
of the South African war, during which
he had acted in the capacity of chief of
the staff of forces in South Africa. In ad-
dition to the thanks of parliament, Lord
Kitchener received a viscountcy and a
grant of £50,000.
The appointment of Lord Kitchener to
control the troops in London for the cor-
onation will give general satisfaction.
Major-General A. E. Corderoy also served
in Egypt and in South Africa. Since 1908
he has been in command of the first Lon-
don division of the territorial force.
Lieut-Gen. Sir Charles Douglas served as
adjutant in the ninety-second Highlanders
during the Afghan war of 1879-1880. He
was present in the action at Kandahar,
and at Mafjaba. He also obtained distinc-
tion in the South African war.
Lieut. Gen. Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien
served in the Zulu war, the Egyptian war,
the Sudan campaign, and in India and
South Africa with equal distinction. Since
1907 he has been in command of the troops
at Aldershot.
