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MUNICIPAL PLATFORM.

Comtee Act Must Be Repealed Says Says Municipal Union.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—"Let good enough alone" was the keynote of the afternoon meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association, as voted in a resolution passed, by which the Legislature will be asked to make no change in the County Council Act as it stands at present.

Prior to their adjournment the association passed a resolution lamenting the death of the late City Solicitor T. F. Caswell.

Comtee Act Must Be Repealed. At the morning session the association dealt with the Comtee Act, and to a member were opposed to it. The following resolution was passed: "That the Comtee Act be repealed, and that the municipalities be given the power to purchase or appropriate on equitable terms any light or water plant."

Mayor Urquhart and Ald. Jones were heard and gave voice to their views on the subject. City Solicitor McIntyre of Kingston wished to supplement words in the resolution by which protection would be given to private capital in event of the act being repealed. To this Controller Hubbard strongly objected, and Mr. McIntyre's proposal was lost.

A resolution of thanks was tendered to the Imperial Government for the interest taken in the question of water prices for the development and transmission of electric energy. The time-worn resolution, asking that the local Government defray the cost of the voters' lists was again passed. The matter of the term of two years' representation by mayors and aldermen met with unanimous approval.

Their Officers Elected.

Controller Hubbard and Mayor Ellis of Ottawa were proposed for the presidency. On an open vote, Controller Hubbard was elected. Mayor Ellis was then elected to the vice-presidency; second vice-president, D. McIntyre; third vice-president, A. D. Cooper, London; fourth vice-president, Warden Beam, Welland; secretary-treasurer, S. H. Kent, Hamilton. The executive this year will give fair representation to every part of the Province, including the County Councils. The following are elected, the Mayor of Toronto, Mayor of London, Mayor of Brockville, Mayor of Ingersoll, Mayor of Cornwall, Mayor of Parkhill, P. MacKinnon, K. C. of Hamilton, City Solicitor Chisholm of Toronto, W. C. Mickle, Belleville; W. A. Boys of Barrie, Charles Collins, Wentworth County; S. R. Armstrong, clerk of Peterboro.

The double tracking of the G. T. R. between Komoka and Kingscourt Junction is going ahead rapidly and will be finished early in October. This will practically mean a complete double track from Chicago to Montreal.

Dozens of appellants appeared before the Court of Revision at Toronto yesterday morning and gave cause why they should not be assessed as assessed. No principle of the law, or its application was under discussion, but simply personal liability.

Twenty-four patients were admitted into the Toronto General Hospital on the 29th ult., the largest number admitted in one day during the past year. There were 290 patients in the hospital Wednesday. On the corresponding date last year there were 217.

Mrs. (Dr.) Torgat, 12 Church st., Brantford, was severely burned on Wednesday afternoon by flames catching from a gas stove to her dress. Her condition is reported to be critical, as she is very weak, though showing improvement over yesterday.

A crowd gathered around and it was thought at first that she was severely injured. P. C. Charles Cavers was summoned with the ambulance, but fortunately, his services were not required as she was not badly injured.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hummell has begun action, through Burrison & Lewis, against the Grand Trunk Railway Company and the City of Hamilton for \$10,000 for the death of her husband, John Hummell, which was caused last June through his being crushed between a G. T. R. car and the wall in the Hamilton yard, on Wellington street. Negligence is alleged.

Embro Courthouse, Reeves McCordugale and Commissioner Chas. Sutherland have let the contracts for two new 16-foot bridges at the cross-roads of the Embro side-road and the third line. These bridges are opposite the farm of Mr. D. I. Rose. The one on the concession road will be built entirely of cement while the bridge on the side road will have cement buttments and a steel superstructure. The total cost for both bridges will be in the neighborhood of \$800. The St. Marys Cement Co. have the contract for the cement work.

Brantford Expositor: Yesterday's regatta in the river in front of Jubilee terrace was not without its incidents. Accidents were numerous, and in one instance resulted seriously. A high wind swept across the river, making navigation especially for the canoes somewhat dangerous. A number of upsets occurred. W. Pinkerton and E. Pitcher, G. Hawkins and Lindsay Spence were among those thrown out. Spence came near drowning. He lost his support and was going down when caught by Messrs. Gains and Potter who went out in a rowboat.
