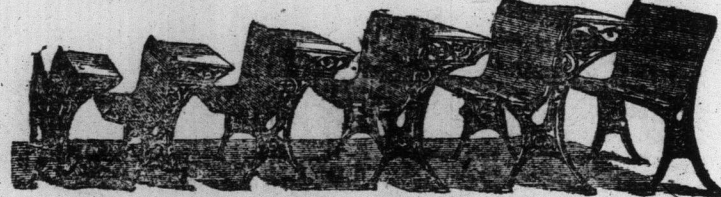

Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30	15 cts
Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40	20 cts
Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50	25 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60	30 cts
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70	35 cts
Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80	40 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90	45 cts
Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100	50 cts

C. H. E. Exams

The results of the examinations
held by the C. H. E. last June have
recently been placed before us, but
as to whether we are to judge the
good being done by that body by
the results of these examinations,
many and divers will be the opin-
ions.

On the whole we find a consid-
erable falling off in the number of
passes as compared with those of
recent years. This may, no doubt,
be attributed to several causes:
The new Syllabus of 1912, with
the raising of the pass mark from
30 per cent. to 40 per cent., while
the papers, as a whole, in the June
examinations of the different grades
(Primary excepted) were of a more
difficult standard than usually.

To quote from the Examiners
report, we find that "many com-
mendable papers were sent in." Still
there must be some defective
teaching or lack of genius when we
read that Henry VII was called the
"Solomon" of English History be-
cause he had so many wives; "set" for "sit" (this occurring
in many papers); "we got to" in-
stead of "we ought to," etc. etc. Yet
we think it is most unfair to judge
the work done by the teachers in
our schools throughout the Island
simply by the results of the C.H.E.
examinations. Many of them do
most admirable work, especially in
these schools where, in addition to
sending up candidates for the coun-
cil's exams, they have to teach all
other standards, including even the
A.B.C.'s. It is practically impos-
sible for such teachers to do efficient
work. Something or someone must
be neglected, and in the majority
of cases it is the children of the
lower standards and those who do
not sit for examinations who are so
treated and consequently suffer.

Still, there is room for improve-
ment in many ways, and we would
earnestly suggest that the system
of teaching throughout be made
more practical than it is at present
and that "cramping" be done away
with.

after my wife Annie and poor little
George; boat sinking fast.

It is evident that the bottle had been
in the water for a long time, as the
bottom was covered with moss. The
letter was written with lead pencil and
can be read distinctly. The paper
which was of a blue color is now faded
almost white. The bottle had drifted
ashore on the preceding night and
when it was thrown on the beach the
neck was smashed off. Mr. Howlin is
mailing letter to whom it is addressed.

The Home Rule Question

London, Sept. 15.—The presence of
the two most prominent Conservatives
of the two Houses of Parliament at
Balmoral as the King's guests, Andrew
B. Law, who was titular leader of the
Opposition, and Lord Curzon Kel-
stone, who recently declared in the
House of Lords that the Irish question
would never be settled except by the
consent of both parties, is keeping the
discussion of the possibilities of an at-
tempt at compromise at fever heat.

Before going to Balmoral Law had a
conference with Lord Lansdowne and
Balfour, former leaders of the opposi-
tion. It is therefore evident that Con-
servative leaders are in consultation
with newspapers of both parties. Eng-
land evidently is anxious for some
settlement which will prevent the
civil war threatened by Ulster if the
Bill becomes law. English parties
might get together, but there is a gulf
separating the Irish leaders for com-
plete Home Rule, as they would accept
nothing else.

sea Wednesday on the Baltic, is lying
in state in the Town Hall at Liverpool
until it is put aboard the Lusitania.

The casket rests on a catafalque
brought from Westminster Abbey
with golden candelabra from the
Abbey also. This is an unprecedented
honor as never has any one been
laid in State in this historic edifice.
