## Religious News

The diocese of Prince Albert being dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, it will be well to remember that on Sunday June 29, the day on which the feast of the Sacred Heart is solemnly celebrated should be a day of special prayer and devotion to the Divine Heart of Jesus throughout the entire diocese. The regulations of the diocese governing this day are that, where

ever possible, the Blessed Sacrament should be exposed from Saturday evening to Sunday evening. If this is not possible the Blessed Sacrament should be exposed on Sunday for a certain number of hours, or at least during the Mass and Vespers. The faithful should be earnestly exhorted to be present in great numbers, during the hours of this public adoration, to pay their homage to the most adorable Sacrament of the altar and the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask.—The Rev. Father A. Jan, O. M. I., rector of St. Paul's Church, Saskatoon, is the new Vicar General and Administrator of the diocese of Prince Albert. Before leaving on his European trip Bishop Pascal, O. M. I., had appointed Abbot Bruno to fill that position, but at the same time he also wisely provided for the eventualty, should something unforeseen befall Abbot Bruno.

SASKATOON.—The bells of St. Paul's church announced the death of the Rt. Rev. Abbot Bruno to local Catholics June 12th and members of the St. Paul's church parish expressed their keen sorrow. Abbot Bruno was popular here. The "Star" in commenting on the demise of Abbot Bruno, in its issue of June 14th, has the following: "Abbot Bruno was taken suddenly ill at the nine o'clock service in St. Paul's church here last Sunday

morning, but was able to finish his mass. He took a turn for the worse, however, and death came Thursday evening. Before the end came he was given the last rites of the church. Abbot Bruno was probably the most able man in Prince Albert diocese and was known and loved by Catholics throughout the northern section of the province. Of unusual attainments and education, he was a man of quiet but commanding personality and since His Lordship Bishop Pascal left for France some time ago, had the administration of the diocese on his shoulders. About sixteen years ago Abbot Bruno with a small number of monks of the famous order founded by St. Benedict 1400 years ago, came from the United States and founded a colony at Humboldt. This grew to probably the most flourishing settlement in Saskatchewan and today its members are among the richest farmers in the Canadian west.

WINNIPEG, Man.—His Grace, Archbishop Sinnott, administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to a large number of school children at St. Mary's Cathedral on Whit Sunday afternoon. On Saturday morning a class received First Holy Communion at St. Boniface Cathedral. In the afternoon the children attended a special service and renewed their baptismal vows.

OTTAWA.—The Sacred Congregation of the Consistory will in future adopt the same method in the selection of candidates for the episcopacy in Canada as has been outlined for the United States. The law is now in effect.

MONTREAL, Que.—Canon Joseph Halle, of Quebec, has been named to the new prefecture established at Hearst, Ontario, on the Grand Trunk Pacific, and his jurisdiction will be in the territory between Cochrane and Kenora. Born at Levis, Quebec, Monsignor Halle made his early studies at that college where he afterwards taught philosophy and theology. He had also been Superior for some seven years. At his appointment he was, however, a member of the Canonical Chapter of the Cathedral at Quebec.

—Monsignor F. X. Ross, Vicar Capitular of the Diocese of Rimouski, celebrated recently the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. He is just fifty years old, and has occupied his present position since the death of Bishop Blais.

QUEBEC, Que.—In the Cathedral on Sunday before last, His Eminence Cardinal Begin ordained ten priests, eight of whom were for the Diocese of Quebec and two for Harbour Grace. Seven candidates received the sub-deaconship and two others minor orders.

ST. CLOUD, Minn.—The convent of St. Peter and Paul's Parish at Belle Plaine, Minn., was destroyed by fire. The chapel was also considerably damaged.

—In accordance with a decision of Bishop Bush the Diocese of St. Cloud will have a second vicar general. Rev. Lucas Fink, O. S. B., pastor of the Immaculate Conception Parish in St. Cloud, has been named for the position.

—Rev. N. Schmitz, ordained thirty-seven years ago, and for twenty-nine years pastor of this place, was buried at Rollingstone June 5th. Rev. J. Meyer, a cousin of the deceased, of St. James, Minn., sang the solemn Mass. Rev. J. J. Treanor was deacon and Rev. G. Jaegen, sub-deacon. Rev. M. Jostock assisted as master of ceremonies. Bishop Heffron gave the last absolution and preached in English. Rev. J. Meier of Winona preached in German and recited the prayers at the grave. The remains were accompanied to the cemetery by forty priests, Monsignor, and the Bishop.

—Msgr. B. Richter celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his succession to the Benedictine Father's charge at Melrose, Minn., on Pentecost. At the time of his appointment to Melrose, Father Richter had been assistant at the cathedral in St. Cloud.

TORONTO, Wis.—A storm which passed through Torun, on June 1st cost the lives of two men when lightning struck the Polish Catholic Church there during divine services. Nine members of the parish were seriously injured, one fatally. The church suffered very little damage.

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—Rev. Bernard Schmitz, O. M. Cap., who observed his golden jubilee as a priest on May 20th, died the following day. Father Schmitz was born in 1852 in Germany and came to this country when a boy. He entered the Capuchin Monastery at Mt. Calvary, Wis., where he made his classical studies. He studied theology at St. Francis Seminary and was ordained on May 20, 1869. After his ordination he was active in different parts of Wisconsin and in 1892 was superior of the Holy Cross Monastery at Milwaukee.

ATCHISON, Kansas.—On June 5th and 6th Bishop Ward conferred the orders of deaconship and priesthood upon the Rev. Adrian Stallbauer, O. S. B., in St. Benedict's Abbey here. Father Adrian was born at St. Benedict (near Seneca), Kansas, Aug. 3, 1893. In 1912 he graduated from St. Benedict's College and entered the Benedictine novitiate at St. Vincent's Abbey, being professed the following year. He spent four years at St. John's University, Collegeville, and completed his seminary course at St. Benedict's Abbey. Fr. Adrian, O. S. B., celebrated his first Mass in St. Mary's Church, St. Benedict, Kans. on June 8th.

CHICAGO.—Rev. John J. Herberger, C. P., of Chicago, dropped dead while preparing to celebrate Holy Mass. Father John was born in Kittanning, Pa., Nov. 1, 1856. He entered the Passionist Order in 1871, and was ordained to the priesthood on May 23, 1880. 20 years of his priestly career were spent in Buenos Ayres, where he did splendid work as a missionary among the Irish people, and left as a monument to his zeal a beautiful church and monastery. He has held various offices in the Order, his last term as superior being that of rector of the St. Louis House, 1914-1917. Sister M. Euphrasia, O. S. B. St. Cloud, and Bro. Evaristus, C. P. Buenos Ayres, are the only living survivors of his immediate family.

RANDOLPH, Neb.—His Grace most Rev. J. Hart of Omaha blessed the new St. Francis de Chantal Church here. The Mass was celebrated by Father Feppert of Rushville. Father Gleason of Willis preached the English sermon and Father Pieper of Howell in German.

CINCINNATI.—On June 4th Mother Mary of St. Martin, Superior of the Price Hill Convent, Cincinnati, observed the 50th anniversary of her profession in the Good Shepherd Community.

WASHINGTON.—Archbishop John Bonzano, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, will sail Sat. June 21st for a conference with Pope Benedict. The archbishop expects to be absent from the United States several months.

ROME.—In an exclusive interview granted the International News Service, Cardinal Gasparri, offered to place the archives of the Holy See at the disposal of anyone wishing to investigate the Vatican's war work and diplomacy. From the very beginning of the war, Cardinal Gasparri said, the Pope was in the unpleasant position of a man walking a tightrope, with both groups of belligerents trying to push him off. Neither succeeded, "Facts

and figures prove that the Vatican actually expended a greater percentage of energy in favor of the Entente Powers than in behalf of the central powers," said Cardinal Gasparri. This was natural, because the Entente countries were more easily accessible to us.

He enlisted at Saskatoon in May 1915 and went to France in June 1916. Just after the signing of the armistice he was in a hospital in England for about two months recovering from an illness. A brother, Charlie Kill, was wounded at the Somme in October 1916 and is now in Winnipeg.

WILLMONT.—The Rev. Father Lawrence joined in the holy bonds of matrimony W. Jos. Lohmann and Clara Margareth Doetzel in St. John's Church on June 3rd.

HUMBOLDT.—Sergt. W. J. Payne and Cpl. H. Smethurst, Ptes. R. Poole, R. Newbold, S. C. Pullin and Geo. Arle were among the recent new arrivals from overseas.

—The businessmen and citizens of the energetic town of Humboldt have decided that it is time to throw off the shackles, trials and tribulations that have accumulated during the past five years and give vent to their feelings in the shape of a grand and glorious lifeseize celebration. Friday, June 27th, was the time chosen and no efforts are to be spared to make this the best time ever, and as Humboldt has an enviable record of doing these things properly you can make up your minds to come to the best little celebration ever staged in this part of the country.

—Lt. McClelland, the noted Saskatoon aviator, has been secured at a great expense and he alone will be a great drawing card. Dear St. Peter's Bote:—

On account of the sudden sickness of the Rt. Rev. Father Abbot Bruno, O. S. B., we had no Confirmation in Viscount and St. John. I., from Allan, both having been specially delegated to that effect.

The ceremony on Monday, the 9th, in Colonsay was remarkable by the number of people, which exceeded two hundred persons. Many came from Allan and Saskatoon. The nice little church was more than filled up. After the blessing, which was performed by Rev. Father Jan, High Mass was celebrated by Rev. N. Perquis, and two excellent sermons were preached by Rev. Father Schweers and Rev. Father Kennedy, O. M. I.

During the whole ceremony we were delighted to hear the singers of Saskatoon, Allan and Tramping Lake, whose co-operation was greatly appreciated. It was, indeed, a great feast for Colonsay.

In the afternoon a little picnic gave to the church a benefit of about \$250.00. Many thanks to all our good friends!
